ARE WE AT THE MERCY OF THE USELESS PUNKS?

Bill's deer ran 1,000 feet after the arrow struck, then fell "dead as a door nail," as Bill put it.

The Louisells will have meat this winter--and that's a sur enough reason for hunting this year.

"I never will give up archery,"
Bill said in an interview Saturday morning. "Age makes no
difference in this sport, if your
health is good."

This is Bill's fourth deer trophy with bow and arrow. He goes deer hunting every year, using only his archer's weapons. He says that archery is a great way to study wild nature.

Bill just got through a teaching term at the Spring Iake High School, where he showed the kids safety procedures with bow and arrow, target practice, and hunting large-animal game, like deer.

"In the woods I'm a lone hunter," Bill said. "I like to do my archery hunting alone. It's safer, for one thing. And you can enjoy the woods better when you're alone."

He practices archery the year round, with a target shooting range of 80 feet, at his lovely home here.

Bill has been an archery enthusiast all his life. He got his first bow and arrows when he was 12 years old, at his home in Ellsworth, nine miles south of Char-

levoix.

The bow was made from an old steel wagon's parasol staves, by an Indian, Howard Petoskey, of Mt. Pleasant. Petoskey was a bookkeeper at Bills' father's potato house in Ellsworth, and was an expert artisan in Indian weapons. Bills' arrows, with this first bow, were simply cat-tail

stalks with a nail in the end of each. The arrows had no feathers.

"We made our own sports, that's what we did," Bill said wistfully.

FIRE DESTROYS OLD HOMESTEAD HOUSE ON THE BILL WILCOX PLACE

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the nearly century-old pine-plank structured house on the Bill Wilcox place on Battle Road in Coldwater Township at about 5 p.m. Friday.

The family had been away and had just returned when small son Scott ran into the mobile-home section of the place where the Wilcoxes live, and said there was fire "out back".

The old house was situated about five feet distant from the family's living quarters in the mobile home, but the Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Fire Department men managed to save the mobile home—a miracle in its being so close to the blazing pine timbers of the old house.

The fire apparently started in rafters of the house, possibly in electrical wiring, it was believed, and spread with incredible speed.

Contents of the living quarters in the mobile home were got out by neighbors and firemen within five minutes, the Wilcox family (Continued on Back Page)

CHIPPEWA HILLS SCHOOLS TO ASK FOR MILLAGE FOR AREA VOCATIONAL PROGRAMS

Without fanfare or public information on the subject, the Chippewa Hills School Board printed a registration notice to electors of the school district on a proposition to levy .9 of a mill for the purpose of building(s) and program for vocational education programs. The push for additional vocational education is from the Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate School District (whatever that is), and the schools in the intermediate district are to go along with the project.

No explanatory material was offered up to last week, only a legal advertisement in the Chippewa Hills Courier, a newspaper circulated from Big Rapids to Evart to Chippewa Lake to Mecosta to Barryton to Remus to Lakeview, Six Lakes and Edmore.

No information was offered to

voters in Isabella County.
Our information comes from a member of the Chippewa Hills school board, whom we called at his home.

Apparently this special election for additional millage is to be slipped over as quietly as possible, according to anything we have been able to learn about it.

A millage proposal for the same purpose was turned down by district taxpayers last year. ---0-



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
