#### Editor's Column

VILLAGE OF FARWELL HAS AN INTERESTING BUDGET

We note in the Farwell paper that the incorporated Village of Farwell offered its budget for 1973-74, and while Farwell is somewhat larger than Weidman, we think its budget is of interest to us.

In its general fund it expects to take in \$93,097.00, of which \$31,000 is property taxes. Its total expected intake of revenues, including state and federal tax returns, is \$69,097.00, and that, with an estimated beginning balance of \$24,000.00, comes to \$93,097.00. That's the town's expected intake of tax monies, local, state and federal. Its expenditures projected for the coming year come to exactly \$93,097.00, leaving nothing in the village till thereafter till further tax collections.

Its budget for its water fund includes a total of \$17,300 take from \$17,000 in water fees and \$300 in hookups. Its final total is \$20,300.00 in expected revenues.

On expenditures, it lists, among other items, \$3,000 in salaries,\$2,000 in utilities and \$2,000 in insurance; construction and repair, \$2,000; supplies, \$2,000. Its total projected expenditures are \$14,940.00, leaving the fund a balance of \$5,360. That's just for a public water system.

Its sewer fund is more interesting. Its receiving fund (it also has an operating fund) lists a hefty \$53, 119.91 in estimated beginning balance. Other revenues are listed, with sewer service at \$14,000, property taxes \$5,000, hook-up fees \$4,100, and hook-up payments \$12,000, for a total expected revenue grand total of \$35,100, which, with its \$53,119.91 estimated beginning balance, gives the sewer fund a grand total of estimated tax-take of \$88,219.91 for the coming year of 1973-74.

On expenditures, it lists: Operation and maintenance, \$18,240. Other expenditures list interest on bonds, 1973, \$18,240; on bonds 1974, \$18,240; and on principal, 1974, \$25,000. Its total expenditures projected for the coming year appear to be \$63,280, leaving a balance in the sewer fund of \$24,939.91. (Continued on Back Page)




