It does fall into place. It's a matter of whether you're looking up or down the street, north or south.

We believe Edith may be right, and that it may be the west side of the Weidman business street in some unnamed

We compared it with another old-time photo we have printed, of Weidman's east side of the business street, and the big building at the street's end does not exactly fit the old Drallette store; and also the other old pic-ture showed the same profusion of telephone lines, about which we expressed doubt last week.

So-thanks, Edith. We do be-lieve it is Weidman's west side of the street, looking north.

FIRE DEPARTMENT GIVES ADVICE ON TRASH BURNING

Have some type of cover for the barrel, such as a screen or some type of grating.

Wet down areas around the burn barrel. Keep watch while burning.

Burn only when the wind is down.

For burning off an odd lot, or near buildings, please contact any Fireman and we will set about to assist you with your burning.

The Nottawa and Sherman Fire Department is still having trouble with home owners who don't have the fire call clause in their insurance policies. This is a small charge, and if you don't have this coverage, you will have to pay for the fire call yourself. Since 1972 the fire call has been \$200.

So please check with your insurance agent to make sure you have this coverage.

Thank you, and be careful this spring with your burning.







JOHN S. WEIDMAN CAME AND BUILT A SAWMILL; THERE WERE TOWNS BEFORE HIM

When John S. Weidman established his sawmill here in 1893 and started a town that was to live and grow, there were other towns around that were either declining or about to decline, due to nearby timber's giving out.

One such town was Two Rivers and we herewith offer an original writing by Katherine Martin of Two Rivers, who is an authority on history of that area and who has a valuable historical collection of photos and data. Here is her piece of writing, which she once presented at one of the annual gatherings of the Two Rivers School Reunion:

Early settlers of Two Rivers were Mr. Davis, W. Reardon, Jess Courser, Herb Nicholson, Mr. Hagerman, John Bunting, in

the year 1887; Dan Nichols, Zeke Ballard in the early 1880s; Fred Ballard came in the spring of 1897.

William Head settled in Nottawa in 1896. The first white man to settle in Nottawa was Michael McGihon, coming here from Detroit in the year 1869.

And Dr. Payne, who located at Beal City. And the well-known Dr. McRae, coming to Two Rivers in 1905 with offices in the Richardson Hotel.

The county post office was at the hotel. Our first rural mail carrier in Two Rivers was Charley Coddington, in the spring of 1902.

Oh, yes; more of Two Rivers: Among our pioneers were Mr.
Mead, Tommy Drake, Mr. Brower. Mr. Stahlman, Abe Eldred,
Samuel Johnston, Mr. Lynn, Lee Merrill and George Secord.

The State Road from Big Rapids over Bundy Hills through Two Rivers, to go to go Town (north Mt. Pleasant), north to Houghton Lake. Dell and Sherwood Bennett and Dave Prothero worked on it to Dog Town. James Bennett and son, Bill, built the bridge across the Chippewa River.

The early settlers of Isabella County organized in 1859 and

established a legal county, composed of Coe, Chippewa and Isabella Townships.

The first white man to settle in Isabella County appeared in 1854 Deerfield was the principal place of starting the county-seat sites, (but was rather quickly moved to Mt. Pleasant).

The first schoolhouse in Two Rivers was built in the early 1870s I chew my food with china clip-The present brick building was built in 1886.

in 1875 Samuel Craft settled at Two Rivers, John Drew in 1879, James Caldwell in 1879,

and in the spring of 1882 started the Two Rivers Hotel.

Mr. Smiley came in the 1870s, Mr. Moses and John Lyons in the spring of 1881. Henry and Jerome Rearden settled here, Mr. Ward on the present Ward farm and Mr. Rearden at the hotel on the west side of town.

A few of the early teachers: Maude Richardson, A. G. Stansell, Kate Kyser, Miss Lewis, Miss Brown, Warren Shorts, Wal-ter Kane, Margaret Davis, Mary Rush, Mabel Murtha, Lavina Bengal (1906 to 1909); Lillian Gannon, 1909; Allen Wolfe 1910 and 1911; Frank Sheahan, Miss Boyer, Edith Seymour, Miss Reed, Miss Cheadle, Hugo Martin, and Lucille Fleming.
