



We continue with Mrs. Kate Martin's account of early days in Two Rivers, discussing the early schools of the area:

In the year of 1882 or 1883, people of the south half of Sec. 31 and 32, Nottawa, got up a petition and the children moved to the Two Rivers School.

The early school of 1860 was held in a log building on the banks of the Coldwater River, by Coldwater Lake

by Coldwater Lake.

The James Bennett children attended, Mr. Bennett coming to Sherman in the early 1860s.

Silas Prothero came in 1872, three girls attending the school; and the John Hyslop children.

Two of the teachers, Carrie Adkins of Shepherd and Clarinda Fordyce of Gilmore, taught about that time.

The school was moved to Sec. 31, 1 3/4 mile north of Two Rivers, Eva Lowe teaching.

Some of the children attending school there were Harriet Eldred, Cora Bennett, Laura Hyslop, and the Lorenz children. That school building, McGihon, was moved 1 1/4 mile west of Beal City. Floyd Rays taught there and lived 1 mile east and 3/4 mile north of Two Rivers on what is now the Frank Haupt farm.

George Waight came to Sherman Township about 1874, John Hines about 1879. Some honorable mention of early settlers around Two Rivers would include Henry Bacon, Jacob Nixon, W. Flaugher, Henry James.

C. W. Richardson came to this county in 1870 and settled on a farm near Dushville. He had interest in a dry goods and grocery store at Dushville, and a half interest in a grocery store at Two Rivers. Mr. Briggs and Mr. Frantz both had blacksmith shops in Two Rivers.

The Two Rivers brick school, Fr. No. 5 Deerfield, was started in 1896. School here began in the late 1870s or early 1880s.

Lucille Fleming Merrihew taught longest of any of the teachers at the Two Rivers School.
