



Dear Connie;

The Weidman Messenger came today (Thursday), just noticed it is dated March 29, and it arrived this noon so that is good service.

I wanted to get a letter off to you in regard to the picture and its identity.

The picture is in front of Dad's Implement Store; my father is the first man at the left with a sailor straw hat, and the man next to him is Gene Davis, a salesman who worked for Dad.

The man leaning on the car is Bill Rickett, a harness maker, who also worked for Dad. The next man may be Tom Hauck, he took care of our horses and helped with the farm implements.

The man in the white shirt, I believe, is Uncle Fred Wool-worth, Dad's brother. My mother is at the wheel of the car (although she did not drive), and next to her is Grandma Bryant. Grandpa Bryant is standing next to her.

There are a few hand implements in front of the store. I think they are potato planters.

Mr. Dawson had a shoe repair shop, and sometimes sold homemade ice cream (a real treat). The store with the Crockery sign is probably Rau's Hardware Store. They had the telephone office, too. Frie Thompson's Drug Store must be next, and then Drallette's Store.

I have many pictures, but am not sure about this one.

family came to Weidman in December of 1912, there were, next to Woolworth's, the Dawson shoe repair shop, John Otterbine's barber shop, and a shop that at one time was run by a man named Miller, who sold shoes.


