THE INSATIABLE DEMAND FOR NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Remember when the bond issue for a new high school for the Chippewa Hills district was presented to taxpayer-voters? The new school was to relieve congestion in all four villages in the district, it was to solve forever any danger of overcrowding in any of the elementary areas.

Now, behold! We are so overcrowded and run-down in all four elementary school buildings that we must build a new "Middle School" to relieve unbearable over-crowding.

We are being asked not for just a puny two and eight-tenths million dollars, but for four million, two hundred thousand dollars, for the new school, the swimming pool we turned down once, and needed repairs on all four elementary buildings.

Inference is that these needed repairs can be made only if we vote ourselves into four million, two hundred thousand dollars' worth of additional debt.

CHIPPEWA HILLS SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION TO CORRECT ERRONEOUS ITEM IN SHOPPERS GUIDE

In a telephone conversation Monday morning with Mike Behnke, director of community school programs and former writer for the school's news organ, the Chippewa Hills Courier-Shopper, we learned that a piece under the heading of "Questions and Answers on the Building Proposal" appearing in the shopper, was written by Charles Baker, administrative assistant (assistant superintendent).

Mr. Behnke said he was composing a news release to correct the item, in the absence of Mr. Baker.

The item in question was this: "I am 67 years old, retired, and own property assessed at \$6500. How will the increased taxes for the bonded indebted-

ness affect me?
Answer: "There would be no increased taxes with the passage of the building proposals. You are exempt up to \$7,000 assessed valuation by legislation."

This is totally wrong, as Mr. Behnke agreed in the telephone conversation. Mr. Behnke said the statement was made according to "hearsay," and that no effort had been made to verify it. We gathered clearly that efforts would be made, and fast, to clarify and correct the statement.

If you are 65 years old or older, and if you own your home and live in it, you can enjoy up to \$2500 tax exemption on the first \$2500 assessed valuation of your property (home). Few Senior Citizens live in

homes assessed at \$2500. We don't know of any whose homes are that poor.

All assessed valuation over \$2500 is taxed, in the Isabella County portion of the Chippewa Hills School District at the rate of \$35.60 per thousand dollars assessed valuation.

Nobody is exempt from taxes on real estate ownership.

If your home is assessed at \$5,000 valuation, for instance, you will pay taxes on \$2500 if you claim the homestead exemption for the elderly. That's it.

We hope we're clear (and we DO hope we're correct) in discussing the homestead exemption situation.

We also hope that the Chippewa Hills school will do as Mr. Behnke promised, and send corrections to the Mt. Plea-

The following piece was brought to the Messenger office Monday afternoon and given us for publication by Mike Behnke, one of the administrators of the Chippewa Hills Schools. While the article is unsigned, it is straight from the administration of the schools and is authentic .-- Editor's Note.

CORRECTION As Connie Skinner of the Weidman Messenger graciously pointed out to us, a statement made in the article entitled "Questions and Answers on the Building Proposal" which appeared in the May 17 issue of the Chippewa Hills Courier-Shopper, was in error.

In answer to the question of how increased taxes for bonded indebtedness would affect a 67year-old retired property owner with property assessed at \$6500, the article read, "There would be no increased taxes with the passage of the building propos-als. You are exempt up to \$7,000 assessed valuation by legislation."

This statement is incorrect. The article should have read that a Senior Citizen has a tax exemption of \$2500 state equalized value (\$5,000 true cash value) on a homestead owned and occupied by himself, and not of \$7,000 assessed, as stated. For the senior citizen who owns and occupies a homestead, this means that any increase in millage will result in an increase in taxes on the remaining assessed valuation beyond \$2500.

We regret the error and trust that it has not caused any undue confusion to taxpayers.

Note: To papers other than the Courier-Shopper, the above statement is being submitted by the Administration of Chippewa Hills School District.




