CMU STUDENTS HAVING
DIFFICULTIES STUDYING
BARN SWALLOWS: BEER BUSTS

Two Central Michigan University students came to the Messenger office Monday afternoon asking us to put in a word on their work in researching barn swallows in Sherman Township.

They are running into resistance from farm owners on letting them go into their barns in late evenings and early mornings to band the birds to tally with the State Audubon Society.

The reason: a certain class of CMU students who ram around the county throwing beer busts in barns, occupied or empty. Farm owners naturally are reluctant to let any CMU students into their barns, especially unescorted and at odd hours of day and night, after experiencing or hearing of beer busts thrown by irresponsible students.

The bird-studying students are Richard Wolinski, who is currently doing a state-wide survey on swallows for the Audubon Society and is assistant curator in the Zoololgy Department at Central.

His partner is Ed Pike, who also is doing research on the birds, and is working with Wolinski on the barn swallow project.

Their research involves records of the birds' nesting behavior and return of birds to the same place year by year.

Last year they banded 350

Last year they banded 350 swallows at the Elwood Miller barn, 42 of them adults. Seventeen adult birds returned to the Miller barn this spring,

They report many new swallows in this area this year.

They say they have had good co-operation from everyone contacted in Sherman Township, but are anxious not to be identified with the irresponsible students entering barns illegally.

They ask that anyone having swallows in a barn or barns who would let these two have a look and possibly band some birds for research, contact them at the Cultural and Natural History Department, Central Michigan University.

VOTERS TURN DOWN MILLAGE PROPOSITIONS

IN CHIPPEWA HILLS DISTRICT
Taxpayers in the Chippewa Hills
school district voted overwhelmingly against all millage proposals put forth on the June 11 ballot.

The 4.2-million-dollar bond issue to build a "middle" school and renovate and rebuild other existing school buildings was the foremost casualty, voters turning in 1304 No votes to 488 Yes, a margin approaching three to one against the bond proposal.

The swimming pool again was snowed under, 1468 No votes counted, with 323 Yes.

On the Intermediate School District's request for additional millage, Chippewa Hills turned it down, 964 No, 829 Yes. Other districts in the vast Intermediate School area, however, carried the vote and the additional millage will go on in this district.

George Weichman and Malcolm Plumton were elected to the Board of Education, Weichman having been defeated last year by John Berryhill, and Plumton seeking re-election.

HOME PAPER FOR THE WEST HALF OF ISABELLA COUNTY DOGS KILL WARD'S SHEEP, NO COUNTY OFFICE CAN ACT

The Burton Wards have been losing sheep in their 80-acre pasture near Two Rivers, with 12 mangled dead sheep, mainly ewes with young lambs, counted and buried, some in the sheep pen itself.

Inquiries at county offices, by the Wards and also by Connie Skinner in their behalf, gleaned the information that the total responsibility for capturing or killings dogs in sheep pastures rests with the farmer and his

family.

The Wards called the County
Sheriff's office, as did also Connie Skinner, and drew the same
response: That in no way can
the sheriff's department take
any action in a farmer's complaint of sheep being killed by
dogs.

It's in the hands of the County Humane Society, or the dog pound, the sheriff's office said. The Wards called the Humane Society, and a man went to the Ward farm in the afternoon and looked around.

There were five dead sheep lying around, but the dog catcher said he didn't see any dogs, and left.

Conversation with the sheriff's department gleaned the contention that it is strictly up to the sheep owner to catch the dogs at the killings, and shoot the dogs.

The Wards have spent several nights in their sheep pasture, the Wards' son and daughter-in-law chasing dogs till midnight last Friday, with no luck in getting a dog. Burton went out at 4.30 a.m. Sunday morning of this week and saw German shepherd-type dogs in the sheep pasture, but they got away.

The Wards are pretty well worn down, by this time. They have traditionally raised sheep on the farm, and have traditionally lost some; but nothing like this summer's slaughter of ewes and lambs. They have about 50 sheep ordinarily pasturing at this time of year.

The Wards are getting rather discouraged, what with sheep slaughter they can't get stopped, and canoers on the Coldwater River cutting a pasture fence put up jointly by the Wards and Charles Garrett for the purpose of containing farm animals.

We suggested to the Wards that they hire a man to police the 80-acre sheep pasture from dusk to 8 a.m. (some of their sheep have been killed after 7 a.m.) We suggested they pay the man regular wages commensurate with such a job, until he shoots and kills the dogs slaughtering their animals; then, we suggested, they turn in a claim to the Board of County Commissioners for sheep losses by dogs, and also the man's wages in the problem of seeing and shooting the dogs.

Their township supervisor advised them against trying it; but we'd do it, if it were our property being lost and we were as devoid of county help as the Wards appear to be in this matter.
