Just speak to any business man or write or phone Ye Ed. We'll gather it all up to present to the two township boards for consideration.



The boys were playing on the lake shore in front of the Sides home, with Kevin's fish pole in the boat at water's edge, and the line in the water--with a large bass lure on it.

Apparently the big catfish took the lure and started off--"The line was like this (slack)," Kev-in said, "and then all of a sudden it went 'zing!' and we grabbed it."

They hauled it out without a net, with the big hook snagged just barely, on one side of the big mouth of the fish.

The channel catfish is the only fish that can't be taken in cloth nets--their fins are barbed and they catch in the net's webbing and can't be retrieved.

The channel catfish also is the only fish with large and tough enough mouth to gobble up bullheads, of which Lake of the Hills has a plenteous supply.

The catfish were planted in Lake of the Hills about three years ago, a thousand six-inch minnows. The boys' Friday catch planted fish.

Others have caught catfish in Lake of the Hills, of lesser size and varying in size, indicating that the original planting is doing all right and spawning regularly each year, with good survival.

Lake of the Hills, like Lake Weidman (the old Mill Pond) has good feeding bottom for fish of all kinds.

The bridge is on the list of replacements after a millage passage by county voters a couple of years ago.

The bridge, with its span less than half way across the Chip-pewa River, blocks traffic on the Airline Road at about three miles west of Weidman. Local people can travel the Airline for only the three miles to the Thompson farm.

Meanwhile, trucks servicing local stores, and through traffic on the Airline to M-66, are forced to drive four and a half miles north on Woodruff Road or two miles south on Coldwater Road in order to get to M-66.
