YES, WEIDMAN SHOULD BE INCORPORATED

Eternally we here in Weidman talk about "We should be incorporated, separated from dependence on two township boards."

That's right, we should be incorporated as an independent village, with our own village of-ficials and our own money to pay for same and also for police protection.

We tried it, several years ago, and lost by two votes. That was a hectic campaign, with dis-senters going house to house to our retired people telling them they'd lose their homes if the town were incorporated.

It was the most vigorous fight against anything ever put up in the town of Weidman.

Still, the town lost its right to run its own affairs by just two votes.

We feel that incorporation-and freedom from dependence on two township boards for dole monies sparsely handed out, could fairly easily be accomplished at this time.

Weidman is continually growing. It is surrounded by recreation facilities: Lakes, and lake recreation projects. Our business here in Weidman is the catering to recreation, and our business places attest to the patronage of "lakers" who buy here.

The mood of doubt about incorporation has been dispelled, long since, and we believe the people of Weidman would vote in favor of it.

Only trouble is, nobody now will take the lead in the really horrendous job of organizing a campaign and drawing up the necessary maps and papers.

Too bad. For we could be independent and run our own affairs, if we could just get past that initial hurdle of who's going to do the dirty work of starting it out.

It has come to our attention, during the past weeks' drought, that burning permits are required of all people proposing to set fire to trash piles or other burning projects.

The wet bin is the small cylindircal tank at the left of photo, where grain from farmers' fields is depositied. It is automatically transferred to the square-shaped drying bin ad-

automatically deposited in the big storage bins when ready.

Additions and new equipment facilities are being put on at all times by the Bader Company.

Today Bader's Mill at Weidman is one of the state's most modern cilities.

BRIDGE AT THOMPSON FARM COMPLETED THIS WEEKEND

The controversial new bridge over the Chippewa River at the Jim Thompson farm on the Airline Road was being completed by Isabella County Road Depart ment workers the weekend.

Jim and Betty have spent the past several weeks trying to persuade the DNR people at Lansing to come up and look at the river as it turns there, and give consent to change the angle of the new bridge (which was changed from the angle of the old one) and remove a spur of island in the middle of the river at the Thompson place.

The spur of land, out in the water, sends the river swirling into a lagoon against Thompsons' land at their barnyard site, and the family have attempted to save their banks by placing field stone there, with poor results. Erosion appears a serious threat at that point in the river.
The County Drain Commission-

er disclaimed responsibilty on the grounds that there never had been any work done by the county in the Chippewa River at that point.

The County Road Department obtained a permit to build the bridge as is, after it was discovered they were working on an old permit for tubes under the road at that point.
So the Airline Road is opened

to traffic and the Thompson farm appears "left out in the cold," as one county official told the Messenger Saturday. ---0---


