WE GOT A PRIMARY ELECTION COMING UP

So we have a general primary election coming up next week Tuesday, Aug. 6, at which time voters will name candidates for offices ranging from townships to state and national.

There's one drawback, in a Primary election: You can't split your ticket. You vote for either Democrat or Republican candidates.


