Editor's Column

THE WEEK THAT WAS

Like the rest of America, we sat and watched history unfolding from last Wednesday through Thursday through the weekend and culminating in the swearing-in of Gerald Ford as our first unelected President to his address Monday night before both houses of Congress.

As Jud Arnett said in Tuesday's Detroit Free Press, now maybe we can begin to pick ourselves

up off the floor.

We personally don't expect too much from President Gerald Ford--although so far he has conducted himself with appropriate candor and humility: He said he was acutely aware that he is not a president elected by the people. Well and good.

Nevertheless, we personally don't expect too much from Gerald Ford as President. He is too deeply ingrained with the loyalties of the Republican Party, as through his 25 years as The Republican From Grand Rapids in the House of Representatives.

And we'll offer just one prediction, politically: If Nelson Rockefeller is appointed and accepted as Vice President--the Republican Party is dead.

Primary election results all over the country showed a violent swing away from the Republican Party while Richard Nixon shadow-boxed through the last hectic days of his "rule," as his daughter Julie once let slip.

Whether Gerald Ford and his new administration can repair the cracks in party solidarity by the time of the November elections is, we think, highly problematical. A large segment of the American people are fed up with the Republican Party under the administration of Richard Nixon (although he practically repudiated that party in favor of one-man rule).

In any case, we are the first Americans to actually watch the making of history, thanks to the boob-tube we so often revile.

As the American people, we are not stupid; and no Washing-(Continued on Next Page)
