Editor's Column

WHAT ARE WE COMING TO?
With breakins and larcenies
increasing at a leap-frog rate
in Isabella County (including
Weidman); with young hoodlums ramming hotrods along
our streets at night; with vandals and thieves destroying vegetable gardens--with thievery
and destruction mounting with
every week and day right here-what are we coming to?

Many are asking this.

Last week a vegetable garden in Gilmore Township was robbed, even to the digging of potatoes. Very early Sunday morning Clayton and Clara Smith, here in Weidman, were wakened by the sound of a car smashing up and down their prized vegetable patch back of their house.

The damage was almost complete, Clara said. Deliberate destruction of tomato plants; smashing squashes; ripping up bean rows--all this by one car driven by a maniac bent on destruction of something good and developed by the hard work of someone else.

There was another breakin at Lake Isabella the weekend. This is becoming a commonplace event, all over Isabella County.

We read the reports of District Court in Mt. Pleasant, in the Daily Times-News, and notice a proliferation of arrests of larceny, the addresses of the teenage to 24-year-old culprits usually in the University area.

The punishment? "Sentence deferred (canceled), \$25 fine."

For our money, the courts are one reason our young thugs feel free to rampage throughout the county. They won't get five years in prison, or even, probably, over night in the county jail. They'll get a "sentence deferred" (written off by the judge), and a slap on the wrist of a \$25 dollar fine.

A very few of our young folks are on a rampage, and apparently they respect neither property nor law.

Clara Smith said, "The police (Sheriff's men) aren't doing anything about it, although we told (Continued on Back Page)
