Editor's Column

SO WE FINALLY GOT THOSE RAINS

So this area finally got those rains it needed badly after nearly a month of drouth. Over the weekend it's figured we got more than two inches of rain, in a series of several days of intermittent showers. The best kind. No high winds, no damaging thunder storms, just nice rain, rain.

Corn farmers on heavy land welcomed the rains as last-minute relief from total disaster. Cornfields in Nottawa were topping out at less than half their normal height of plant. Now, with the soakeroo the whole county got, corn farmers can expect a reduction of 10 to 20 percent in harvest, instead of disaster. Later corn plantings will do well if moisture continues favorable, County Agent Lyle Thompson said Monday, and could outstrip earlier plantings in ear production. The silage yield for early-planted corn is expected to be low (that's winter feed for stock, to us dabblers in plantings).

Corn fields in Nottawa, Gilmore and Isabella Township vary from farm to farm, according, mainly, to date of planting. Many fields were too wet for early corn planting this spring.

We dabblers in growing, the home-garden nuts, are doing very well, thank you. Those of us who put the sprinkler-hose on our vegetable gardens during the drouth have bumper crops of potatoes, tomatoes, peas, beans, and Ye Ed has an amazing crop of broccoli of giant plant proportions. Frances Tranbarger has had early cabbages bursting their heads since the rains came.

Don Smith reports a prize garden, with no watering help during the drouth. He has brussels sprouts, cabbage, sweet corn, five varieties of tomatoes, and carrots, beets, lettuce, radishes, onions, peppers, and potatoes. He had to replant his string beans but the family has been canning them steadily the past week or so.

Other prize vegetable gardens in Weidman include those of Fred Wilcox (a model of planned planting and absolute freedom from weeds). A pleasure to look

The lot for the new Baumann's IGA Store and shopping center is a huge one, with 167 feet of frontage on Woodruff, 390 feet to the south, and a back line of 390 feet. It includes a lot formerly occupied by Flossie Davy and her son later, to the east; north behind the Drive-In, and south behind the site of the former Weidman Family Restaurant.

The shopping center will be known as Baumann's IGA Foodliner; and it will contain 10,000 square feet of store space. Its present space inside is 4,000 feet, in the Shook Building.

The new building will be one story, of steel construction with brick veneer on front and trim. Entrance will be on the south side of the building, with plate-glass front on Woodruff Road.

Card Construction Company of Mt. Pleasant is architect and builder for the project. They plan to begin work this month, with completion and opening of the mammoth new facility slated for December at latest.

According to the planners, the coolers will be outside the main building, leaving room inside for a 32-foot fresh meat case, a 12-foot cold-meat case, and 32-foot cases each for produce, dairy and frozen food conveniences. All this adds up to great

enlargement of anything Weidman has ever seen in its boundaries in the way of food-service stores.

There is allowance for four check-out stations on the plans, with an extra one for future use as business grows with the town.

A 14-foot aisle-way on the north side of the building will be devoted to dry goods, self-serve items on hangers, etc.

Weidman sure is growing. And we count ourselves fortunate to keep our major businesses on our main street, to form a solid shopping area extending the present facilities.

Erskine, John says, is a town about the size and "feel" of Weidman, its only standout feature a huge grain elevator.

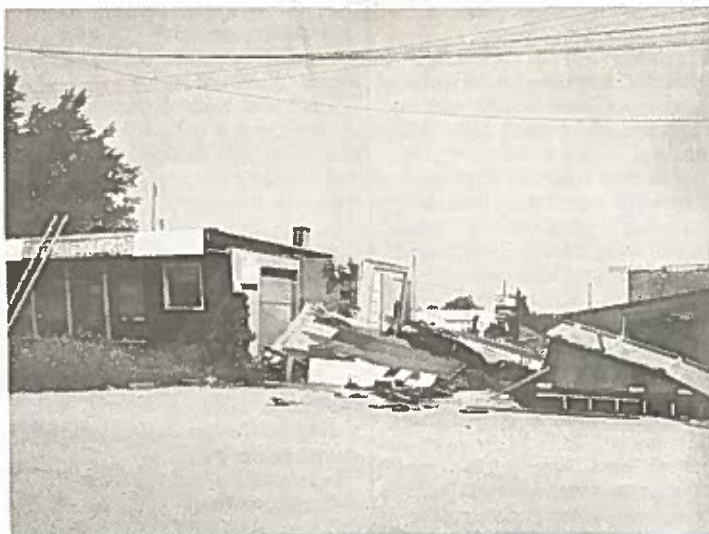
He found a small tourist stop-over consisting of a box-top gas station and "motel" accommodations consisting of mobile homes, some divided into two suites, as John found his.
