### WANT TO KEEP LAST FEW SHREDS OF FREEDOM HERE? ATTEND MEETING SATURDAY

If you're interested in keeping a few of the last shreds of personal freedom in our area townships, you better attend a public meeting called by the Township Boards of Sherman and Coldwater for Saturday at 1 p. m. at the Weidman School.

It has to do with adoption of a building code: another link in the long chain of the State of Michigan's program for curtailing personal freedom in the matter of handling of personal property.

The state legislature, a year or so ago, passed a State Building Code that applies specifically to Detroit, Wayne County and the other densely-populated counties surrounding Detroit.

The state building code as laid out by the legislature restricts a property owner from handling any aspects of building or remodeling on his own property.

Local opinion (including the Mt. Pleasant-oriented County Board of Commissioners) says the state code was written in Wayne County for the building-trade unions.

Under the state code, you must have a licensed carpenter, electrician, plumber, et cetera, to do anything around your house or proposed house, almost down to replacing a burned-out light bulb. Not quite, but almost.

We don't need the Detroit building code in the townships of west Isabella County. We're still quite rural, thank you, and we still demand a small amount of personal freedom in our handling of our property.

The Township Boards of Sherman and Coldwater are asking everyone to attend Saturday's meeting at the school, and have invited the Township Boards and the people of Nottawa and Broomfield Township also to be present.

The townships must adopt a ready-made, unalterable building code willy-nilly, with a choice of three different codes, the least offensive being chosen by the state Township Officials' Association for townships to adopt. It

### CRIME RISES SHARPLY IN THE WEIDMAN AREA

Crime is rising week by week in the Weidman area, with last week's sensation abating somewhat after the arrest of four young men on Woodruff Road for possession and use of marijuana. Other crime incidents, however, have raised the fears of people here.

The four arrested for possession and use of marijuana were taken in at 9.59 last Wednesday night by Sheriff's officers. The car had been stopped for a traffic violation, and upon nearing the car the deputies noted a strong odor of marijuana coming from the car.

Three young Weidman men and one juvenile were arrested. Confiscated from the car was about three pounds of marijuana with a value of over \$450 (street value \$900).

The juvenile was released to the custody of his parents, while the three young adults were held in the county jail pending arraignment in District Court on Sept. 5, or Thursday.

Two of the young adults were slapped on the wrists with \$75 fines for possession, and six months' probation. The other was held on \$1,000 bond pending hearing in Circuit Court for possession with intent to sell marijuana.

Marijuana has been found growing in several places in the close Weidman area of late weeks. On the old Taylor orchard place a couple (who rented the house) were arrested when 10-foot plants of marijuana were found growing around their front porch. It was estimated that the plants would net 50 pounds of usable marijuana, or "pot", valued very highly. The couple was charged with raising marijuana with intent to sell. They were heard in District Court Monday and demanded examination.

### TOUR GROUP ENJOYS TRIP TO NEWFOUNDLAND

**Believe It Or Not**

During the months of January, February and March, we had a hot lunch program (in 1925!).

Three days of each week our lunch-pail food was supplemented by a hot dish.

We converted one entry into a kitchen, equipped with a three-

burner kerosene stove, a small table, some shelves, and a limited amount of cooking utensils. A bowl and spoon for each child, and a water pail in which we carried our water supply from an outside pump.

Under the supervision of the teacher, the seventh and eighth grade boys and girls prepared and served the hot dish to the 40 or more pupils.

The food supplies were generously donated by the very co-operative parents of the children. We bought some extras with money we made at a box social held in the fall. Our menu was limited to the dish for the day, which consisted of vegetable soup, salmon soup, potato soup, bean soup, or the all-school favorite of mashed potatoes and brown gravy.

Although this lunch program required extra time and work for teacher and pupils, we still found time to complete all the usual studies and work activities required of a K through 8-grade classroom, and the 13 seventh and eighth grade pupils all succeeded in passing the state examination when it was presented at the end of the school year.

Any township or group of townships adopting the lesser of the evils of building codes must enforce the code in its entirety--and it's a big thick book.

Any group of townships can go together as a unit and adopt the less evil code--which is the object of attempting to interest Nottawa and Broomfield folks in going in with us with a code less stringent than that written for Detroit and adopted as the state's building code, which is what we will get if we don't adopt one of our own.

Cost of enforcing a building code is high, which is the reason for several townships' going together on it, to share the cost.

Bless the legislature, and the State of Michigan. Republicans in the legislature say it was the Democratic majority in the legislature, bossed by the labor unions who put the law across. Let us not forget that Gov. Milliken signed the bill.

In any case, regardless of who's to blame or why, it's now up to us as individuals to save a few shreds of individual freedom in our country settings here.

So mark your calendar and BE THERE at the Weidman School Saturday afternoon, Sept. 14--that's this Saturday.

Don't depend on someone else to save your liberties for you. Too many people doing that will lose our few remaining freedoms.
