



OLD EIGHTH GRADE GRAD PROGRAM LISTS MANY WELL KNOWN NAMES

Back in 1916 the rural schools' eighth graders graduated at a county-wide festival in Mt. Pleasant, beginning with graduating exercises at the Opera House in Mt. Pleasant (upstairs over a drug store), followed by a "Field Day and Play Festival" at Island Park.

On the 1916 program brought in by Marie Swindlehurst, President Charles McKenny of Michigan State Normal College delivered the main address.

The graduates marched from downtown Mt. Pleasant to Island

Park for the afternoon program.

The program included an "Isabella County Athletic Club Badge Test" in three classes; a Play festival, a field meet, and a baseball game. That year's ball game was between the Indians at the Indian School at Mt. Pleasant and the Weidman team.

In the 1916 graduation year, there were around 200 eighth-graders getting out of school or going on to high school, an elite distinction in those days.
