RULES OF REVOLUTION MAY BE A HOAX, BUT THEY WORK

In a recent column in the leftist-leaning Detroit Free Press, leftist-leaning columnist James Kilpatrick roundly ridiculed the "Dusseldorf Rules for Revolution," a document alleged to have been "captured in May, 1919, by the Allied Forces".

Kilpatrick does a good job of ridiculing "patriotism, pizzaz and the old brrrumph". He prefers to accuse and ridicule gun clubs and fish clubs and such.

Well, here are the "Dusseldorf Rules for Revolution", and we leave it to our readers to decide whether or not they have been working.

The first is: "Corrupt the young; get them away from religion; get them interested in sex; make them superficial; destroy their ruggedness."

Here's the second rule: "Get control of all means of publicity. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule and obloquy. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prizes and general discontent. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders, and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders."

And finally: "Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to confiscating them and leaving the population helpless."

That's where Kilpatrick really goes to work on downgrading any credence as to the "Dusseldorf Rules". He cites a long list of publications that reprinted the "Rules for Revolution," without comment on the newspapers and house organs using the reprint.

He winds it up with a smartalec jibe at sportsmen's clubs as the probable sponsors and backers of the "Rules for Revolution," apparently just to get their own firearms safely under the laws.

GERALDINE HORAN BEAL CITY CHURCH ORGANIST DIES AT 64

Geraldine Horan died last Thursday at Pleasant Manor Nursing Home in Mt. Pleasant, having suffered a stroke seven years ago.

She was a brilliant music student of the Catholic Sisters at Beal City in her childhood, at the time when the Sisters had a quite complete music-teaching program outside the parochial school.

On graduation from the eighth grade she studied the organ at the Catholic Academy in Bay City, and thereafter spent about 10 years as organist at the St. Henry Church at Rosebush.

She was organist at the Beal City Catholic Church for well over 25 years, and saw the music equipment change from a wornout pipe-organ to an electric instrument, which she mastered with ease.


