

HERE'S THE VOTING MACHINE AT SHERMAN TOWN HALL-And it's not complicated, and it's foolproof. You can't spoil your ballot on it. If you make a mistake, you can either erase it and go on, or push a button upward and sweep the whole

board clean and start over. Voters of Sherman Township are strongly urged to turn out at the primary election next Tuesday and use the new machine.

Frances Tranbarger and Connie Skinner were among those taking advantage of instruction on use of the machine Monday evening, and we found it much easier and much more effective than we'd imagined.

The machine was set up and put in running order by Keith Loomis, who happens to be Sherman Township Clerk and also an expert electronics workman. He did a good job, and the machine works on a no-possibility of your losing your vote through error.

On election day, we were told Monday evening, there will be a member of the Election Board standing at the machine, ready to help you if you get mixed up on what you want to do on it.

Personal instruction is going on every evening this week through Friday, from 6 p.m. to 10, and we urge voters to get out there and learn the machine before election day.

The machine is there to stay; and voters refusing to learn to use it now will have the problem remaining indefinitely. A primary election is a fine time to get used to the new voting ma-

There are three parties on the ballot as, shown by the rows of tabs in the photo above. The parties are Democratic, Republican, and American Independent Party. You just choose your party and follow names across

the board.

This primary election is a hot one, with alternatives, for once, for voters' choice. John Engler is opposing Russell Strange for State Representative, on the Republican ticket. James C. Turner, a crusading editor who accused legal bigwigs in Livingston County and other parts of the state of chicanery—and

won!--is a candidate opposing Wm. Milliken for Governor of

Many Republican voters will be happy to see they have an alternate choice besides Lenore Romney, the hand-picked candidate of Republican State Central Committee. Her opponent for nomination is Robert J. Huber, and you'll see his name along with hers, on the machine.

Vance Wood has been drafted to run as Supervisor of Sherman Township, opposing Earl Oplinger on the Republican ticket.

Vance's votes will be write-ins, and there's a place on the machine for that, too. Vance filed for nomination as

Vance filed for nomination as Township trustee, and his name is on the ballot for that; but if you should write in his name and then turn the tab at his name for trustee, you won't spoil your ballot, as Vance did not file as a candidate for Supervisor.

So--do get out there, Sherman folks, during this week, and get a look at the machine so you won't be scared come election day.

And do get out there next Monday, Aug. 4, and vote your choice on your ticket.

This is a very important primary election.

HOME PAPER FOR THE WEST HALF OF ISABELLA COUNTY

EARLY HISTORY OF SHERMAN CITY

Some settlers who were prominent in the early days of Sherman City were the Thompson and Pointen families.

One of the oldest remaining members of this pioneer Thompson family is John, or Jack, as most people know him, now nearly 85 years of age. It is he who relates this story as he remembers it:

By Jack Thompson My father, James William Thompson, mother Adeline and sisters Eva and Lura, along with my grandfather, James Thompson, and mother's parents, the James Pointens, came from Sharon, Pa., to settle in Sherman City.

They came by covered wagon, arriving here the 8th of November, 1870, just ahead of a severe snowstorm.

Sherman City at that time was near the river, all in Mecosta County.

When the Thompsons and Pointens came, they settled on the east side of Sherman City, in Isabella County.

My grandfather, James Thompson, was the second minister in Sherman City, preaching in a tent across from the present church.

A son, Jesse Thompson, was also a minister, and another son, John Thompson, was a doctor.

My father, James William, the eldest son, had been a tinsmith in Pennsylvania, and continued his trade at Sherman City, making pails, stove pipes and eaves troughs. He was also Township Supervisor for several years.

My grandfather, James Pointen, owned and operated the first hardware store in Sherman City. He also built several stores and houses in the area.

My parents, James and Adeline Thompson, and family, later moved to an 80-acre farm just north of my present one, in Sherman Township. Here five more children were born: three sisters, Mattie, Dora and Myrtie, and a brother, Will, and I.

I later bought the present farm on "the flats" by the Chippewa River and built the present house and barn. The barn timbers were brought from across Eight Point Lake in the winter while the lake was frozen.

I have lived my whole life on these farms: 85 years in August. My son, Jim, and wife, Betty, with their two sons now own the original farm, having purchased additional acreage to add to the old home farm.

The original 80-acre farm has been in the family nearly 100 years.


Bus fare will be \$5.75 for the Detroit trip, with 50¢ admission to the game. The party will stop and eat sack lunches


