

from parents.


Roy Adams was presented a second gift as umpire and also for 15 years of coaching Little

League teams.


Jim Carrick announced that more donated help is needed to get the Little League diamond in shape for another year. More boys are expected to be playing, and willing fathers are needed to help, he said.

JOHN L. FOREST HAS

INTERESTING VACATION TRIP John L. Forest enjoyed a sightseeing vacation trip last week, starting out early Monday morning and returning Thursday.

This year his trip took him through northern Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Northern Michigan.

His particular interest this year was the Mesabi iron mountain range, the biggest such iron range in North America.

John enjoyed the Museum of Mining at Chisholm, Minn., where the U.S. Steel Corporation has also an open-pit mine, the largest open-air mine in the country. It is 700 feet deep, four miles across and three miles wide. John says there is no underground iron-ore mining now, it is all open-pit.

The ore is shipped by rail to Duluth, then on to Chicago and

Detroit, usually by boat.
High-grade ore is 50 percent iron, John found, but most of the iron mined is low-grade, or about 30 percent. He brought home samples of high-grade iron ore, one batch just as it came from the mines.

At the Itasca State Park in Minnesota, John stepped across the Mississippi River, at a monument where the river rises in a boiling spring. At Bemidji he saw the huge statue of Paul Bun-


