ISABELLA COUNTY TAXPAYERS ASS'N INVESTIGATES THE COUNTY WELFARE SYSTEM

At the October meeting of the Isabella County Taxpayers Association, Chariman Gerald Cole announced that the executive board had voted to investigate welfare situations in Isabella County. As a step in this direction, he asked members of the Taxpayers Association to turn in any names in cases felt to be receiving welfare unfairly.

Maynard Cole, director of the county welfare department, is expected to attend the next board meeting, and names will be presented to him at that

time.

Only names are needed, Association officials say. They will sign any forms necessary for investigation. Names may be given or sent to Gerald Cole, 1385 N. Shepherd Road, Mt. Pleasant Route 5; or any township or Mt. Pleasant delegate to the Taxpayers' board.

It was voted by the attending membership to submit two resolutions to Rep. John Engler. The resolutions deal with an investigation of the "assessors' schools" and with a return to the old County Board of Supervisors.

When contaced last Friday, according to the Mt. Pleasant Times-News, John said he would like copies of the resolutions for study, and would try to attend




