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PUBLIC HEARING AT TOWN HALL WELL ATTENDED

A public hearing Thursday night at 8.30 at the Sherman Township Hall drew township residents to fill the place, and a proposed township ordinance was read, discussed, criticized, and suggestions for change made, all in good humor and with neighborly consideration.

Much was accomplished at this meeting, both in the way of clarifying the ordinance proposed by a committee appointed by the Township Board, and in the way of good fellowship among land owners of various locality descriptions.

A statement in the Rural Zoning section ruling that all rural lands would be under the same restrictions as "residential" zones meaning city or village areas, was objected to by farm owners, and townspeople chimed in and agreed, and the placing of rural areas as "residential" in restrictions was stricken from the proposed ordinance.

Many sections were clarified,

as farmers objected to restrictions on use of land and buildings. This also was clarified and amended to the satisfaction of those present.

A question on the removing from public view of junk yards and other objectionable accumulations was clarified and rewrit-

One more public meeting will be held, when area people can still express their opinions and objections, if any; then the ordinance must be published once, and thereafter it takes affect 30 days after publication.

Robert Myers of Rosebush did an outstanding job of auctioneering, which he performs annually gratis for the Weidman church.





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



Ted suffered brain damage from a head injury and a fraçtured shoulder and arm. Their baby suffered a broken arm and both legs fractured, and was in shock.


Larry Mount, riding with the family, suffered a fractured pelvis and broken arm.
