TAXPAYERS SUE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS ON MILLAGE

A suit was filed Jan. 25 by Bert L. Cole and Patricia Cole on behalf of all taxpayers of Isabella County, asking the Circuit Court Judge to grant a permanent injunction against the Isabella Co. Board of Commissioners to prevent another over-laying of taxataion beyond the constitutional 15-mill limit without asking the taxpayers through an election.

The suit also asks for recoveries of tax monies collected over 15 mills in 1971, and that the Co. Board of Commissioners pay court costs in connection with the suit.



Tuesday in the county was a day of immobilization for all except the few brave souls who attempted to get to jobs in Mt. Pleasant and elsewhere. Many didn't make it.

Alan Marshall, of Marshall's Garage in Weidman, was out all morning, mainly driving people back to their homes after they had abandoned their cars on the slick ice.

No mail went out on the Weidman Route Tuesday, as roads would have prevented it and anyhow the Saginaw truck, due here before 8 a.m., arrived in the afternoon.

All area schools were closed Tuesday and Wednesday, with no opening prospects announced Wednesday.

County road trucks were delayed, according to Charles Zalud, by the necessity to get chains and install them for each truck going out. The usual application of brine on ice was abandoned, as sub-zero temperatures made brine a worsening of the situation.

Added to sub-zero temperatures were high winds, lowering the "chill" factor to figures in the 40-below-zero area.

A semi-truck supply tanker loaded with fuel oil for the Beal City Service Station was literally blown off the road, according to Harold Rau, owner of the station, overturning the rear half of the tanker.

For the first time in seven and a half years, the Weidman Messenger is a day late, as Connie flunked that before-daylight drive to Mt. Pleasant Wednesday morning. Roads still were listed as extremely hazardous during the day Wednesday.

Barney Tranbarger was taken by ambulance to CMC Hospital Tuesday morning, the ambulance driver choosing the Coldwater Road down through Broomfield Township to get to M-20 as soon as possible. The Coldwater Road, up and down those hills of Broomfield, was a solid glare of ice, but the ambulance driver never slid an inch, Frances Tranbarger said. (She rode over in the front seat of the ambulance.)

We are deeply indebted to Bernard and Yvonne Pitts, who volunteered to drive to Mt. Pleasant late in the afternoon and bring Frances home (Comie had promised to drive over and get her). Bernard took the Weidman Road the 10 miles east of town to Old US-27, and said later that road was untreated and solid ice, as was also Old US-27. He took M-20 and the Winn Road back, finding the going less nightmarish.

We are also indebted to Jim Hughes, of Radio Station WCEN, who broadcast Tuesday the news that the Weidman Messenger would be a day late. Most of our local readers knew by Tuesday afternoon they wouldn't get their Messenger quite on time this week.

CMC Hospital emergency room was crowded, and the hospital itself was full up. Barney Tranbarger finally got a room but had to wait several hours for it.

We'll give it a try Thursday morning; but if your paper is very late, you'll know we again flunked out on those icy roads.
