STEVENS HOLSTEIN DAIRY FARM SIRE LISTED GOLD MEDAL BY ASSOCIATION

The Holstein-Fresian Association of America has listed a sire from the Joseph Stevens & Son Holstein Dairy Farm as one of three Gold Medal bulls in a late listing by the association.

A Gold Medal Sire is the highest honor a bull can achieve in the Holstein-Fresian Association

of America.

In the pedigreed dairy business there is more than family trees. Worth of a cow or bull is placed on performance of cows, daughters of bulls who may become, as the Stevens' bull did, a Gold Medal Sire.

The Stevens' bull is Ionia Creator Cymbol, and the Stevens herd has daughters of his which are performing so highly in milk production that they really gave the sire his Gold Medal status.

Only four Gold Medal Sires in Michigan are listed by the Holstein-Fresian Association in its current Michigan-Indiana magazine. The Stevens sire is one of the four, which is a great honor and achievement.

The Stevens family, Joe and Hulda and their son, Richard, have spent their lifetimes building the high-ranking Holstein dairy herd and the farm and buildings demanded for a prize herd of milk producers.

The Stevens Holstein Dairy Farm has been testing cows for milk production since 1938, a long and tedious road for the owners of registered herds. But their work and sizeable money investments are beginning to show now, as the farm is known throughout national Holstein-Fresian circles, and the Stevens Farm now sells only herd sires and heifers -- all registered, of course, their pedigrees carefully documented.





Most everyone took pictures of the sycamore tree where Zacheus climbed to see Jesus as He passed by. Most everyone walked up so many steps to see the ruins of Jericho. Again, I stayed in the bus.

We had a banquet in the evening. Next day had lunch at Nazareth, stopped at Jacob's well, also visited Mary's well, where the water still flows as it did the day Mary met Jesus there and he told her of the living water she might receive.

Nazareth was a very busy city. Went on to Cana, where Jesus turned the water into wine. This was a fertile valley, and the place where they plucked the corn and ate on the Sabbath Day.

We went on to Tiberus, where there were flocks of goats and sheep, shepherds watching them.

On to the Sea of Galillee, where Jesus commanded the wind to stand still. We all boarded three boats, crossed the Sea of Galilee. Half way across the American flag was raised and we all sang "God Bless America." Had a service while the three boats lined

up at anchor in the sea. It was impressive.

We had lunch on the shore. A large fish was served each one, which they called Peter's fish. We were to have been served on the ground, as Jesus served the men the loaves and fishes. Weather did not permit.

We saw the Mount of Beatitudes. At Tiberus we saw the old wall. Everything was closed, as it was

the Sabbath Day.

Jordon River was next, the first river after reaching the Holy Land. There was a baptismal service in the Jordan River. Fourteen were baptized.

Sunday morning at 8 o'clock we were on our way to Bathsheba. to visit the synagogue where Jesus preached. a plane leaving Tel Aviv for Athens. While on the plane, saw a beautiful rainbow while flying over the Mediterranean.

There were 15 different demonstrations on the tour. Four of us hired a taxi and drove about the city of Athens to see it by night. Tuesday morning at 20 to 8 we were in the bus, ready to tour the city. I sat in the bus while others climbed the million and one steps to see the ruins of the Acropolis. Several explored the ruins of old Corinth, where Paul preach one and a half years.

We crossed the Isthmus Canal both going and coming on this morning's tour. We visited Mars

Wednesday morning at 7 o'clock we were in the lobby of the Ambassador Hotel in Athens, waiting for our bus to take us to the plane of Zurich.

We visited Lazarus' and Rachel' tombs, and many others I failed to get down in my notes. We had a service on the hills where shepherds were watching their flocks at night when they saw and followed the star that took them to Bethlehem. We visited the

Church of the Nativity, saw the manger where the Baby Jesus lay. Saw a cow hitched up with a

donkey plowing. Many people carrying large packages and water on their heads.


