THE SKY'S THE LIMIT ON PROPERTY TAXATION

As pointed out in the April 1 edition of the Farm Bureau's "Michigan Farm News", the Michigan Supreme Court has confirmed what the Farm Bureau says it has recognized for some time: That on capital outlays such as county and township buildings, drainage districts, sewer systems and school buildings, "the sky is the limit" on the amount of property tax officials can lay on taxpayers, even without a vote of the people.

While we personally do not go along with Farm Bureau's endorsement of Gov. Milliken's and the Democratic Party's tax petition proposals, we do recognize that the lowly property own-

er is truly in a bind.

It's a bind that can strip him of the land he has worked all his life to pay for; it can strip him of his home, his farm, his recreation lot (if he is so lucky!) through excessive and unrestrain-

ed real estate taxes.

We reject Gov. Milliken's tax proposal (it's for an amendment to the Michigan State Constitution) because there's some fine print not publicized that gives the state the power to tax real estate without recourse of the land owner.

We have no solutions. We only suggest that all the politicians--ALL the politicians, and Milli-ken is one--are holding out sops to taxpayer voters with next fall fall's election in mind.


It's from Clare Brown's column (who's she--county extension agent?) and it's a snorter.



Skeletal meat is meat stripped from bones. Federal law permits lungs, stomachs, udders, eyes, hearts, lips, snouts and ears to be ground up in hot dogs, bologna and other sausage products."

She winds up by saying that three big out-state packing companies have filed suit in Grand Rapids claiming that since they already meet federal standards for ground meat products, they should not have to meet the higher standards set by Michigan.

She says that about 400 manufacturers in Michigan are operating successfully under Michigan standards. If the out-state processors are permitted to ship in lower quality ground meats, the Michigan producers will have to lower their standards as well in order to stay in business.

She urges readers to write to State's Attorney Frank Kelley in Lansing, and your state Senator and Representative.

There she leaves us hanging. We can't see where law-makers or the Attorney General can or should be able to influence a suit in a court of law.

We do agree with her last para-

graph, though:

"If the courts rule in favor of the national legislation, and at present unless Michigan residents voice their opinions it looks as if they will--I've eaten my last hot dog, sausage or lunch meat sandwich.
