ERNEST GRAY HONORED ON HIS BIRTHDAY



A History of Weidman

MRS. MINNIE (CASS) Mac-CREADY DIES IN FLINT

Mrs. Edith Kennedy sent us a notice from the Flint Journal of the death of Mrs. Minnie (Cass) Mac Cready, who died April 21 at the age of 95 in an Extended Care unit in Flint.

Burial was in Forest Hill Cemetery at Everett, according to the Flint paper.

Surviving are a son, Roland Cass, a grandson and one greatgrandson; three great-granddaugh ters, and other relatives.

She was born on a farm near Sherman City and attended the one-room school near Brinton.

The area around the family farm was lumber country, and in her early teens she worked as a cook in her uncle's lumber camp.

On her 16th birthday she was married to Archie Cass. They lived on a farm near Evart for 10 years, then moved to Lansing where he worked at Reo Motors until his retirement. Mr. Cass died Aug. 11, 1943, a few months after the couple's 50th wedding anniversary.

After her husband's death, she took "the hardest job I ever had," as she put it, making 400 salads a day in the Lansing Sexton High School cafeteria.

She married Frank MacCready, a retired postal employee, in 1951.

When he died in 1967 he was believed to be the oldest member of Genessee County Barracks 877, Veterans of World War I.

She then lived with her son, a widower, for whom she kept the home.

In an interview on her 92nd birthday, she said to a Flint Journal reporter that "people don't have as much fun now. We didn't have cars to wreck, but we had better times."

(Editor's Note: We present here a letter from Edith Kennedy of Flint, which is a very graphic account of life in the pioneer days of our area.) Dear Cnnnie:

I am sending this article and obituary, as I saved it from our (Flint) Journal. I don't expect anyone up there remembers her, but I remember her father, Theodore Tombs, who used to be among my uncles, the Tower boys, often.

Mrs. MacCready married and left those parts. There are not many of us old-timers from Brinton left any more.

My folks came from Millbrook when I was four years old, and lived one winter in the Wagenman settlement, then lived in one of the rows of tar-papered shanties in Brinton.

My Dad then worked in a mill that stood right where the North Brinton Cemetery is now.

Brinton had 18 charcoal kilns that consumed the cordwood from the lands being cleared.

Pete and May Aylsworth had a hotel and saloon there, and there were several big log houses where working men boarded and had bunk beds on the walls.

The first IOOF Hall burned down and Seth Doty lost his life in the fire.

I remember when Martin Boger's parents were married, and when Martin was born. If I remember right, Mrs. Levi Wagenman was a sister to Henry Bo-

I see by the Messenger Brinton is getting to be quite a village.

My parents bought 80 acres of land east of Brinton, built the first house on it and lived there 48 years before their deaths. I don't get up that way much, of late years, but take care of my daughter Flossie, as she had those strokes that were bad on her and she can only get around with some help. My 88 years are telling fast on me of late, but I'm thankful to be able to do for

I think of Lizzie and George's birthdays in July, and myself and my husband, Bert Kennedy, both had birthdays in January.

Connie, I'm glad you keep quite well, and hope the Messenger lasts as long as I do. Very best wishes to you,


