ED OPLINGER RECEIVES AMERICAN FARMER DEGREE--Alpha Trivette (left), National president of the Future Farmers of America, presents the American Farmer Degree to Ed Oplinger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Oplinger of rural Weidman (Horr). The American Farmer degree is the highest degree of membership in the FFA. It was present to Ed, along with degrees to 702 other FFA members during the 48th National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 11-14.

Ed is a 1972 graduate of Chippewa Hills High School, and his vocational agriculture instructor was Dan Latendresse of the Chippewa Hills High School.

Ed is one-third owner of the Oplinger farming and beef-raising operation of the family.

Ed was nominated for the highhonors degree by the Michigan FFA Association. Ed received his degree in a special ceremony Nov. 13 in Kansas City. Only students who have earned the State Farmer degree are eligible for the American Farmer degree.

In addition to having earned the State Farmer degree, candidates for the American Farmer degree must have been active members of the FFA continuously for at least three years. They must have a record of participation in local and state FFA activities, and they must have completed all vocational agriculture instruction offered in their high schools.

American Farmer applicants

must have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts through their occupational experience program, and must have their earnings productively invested or deposited in a bank. Finally, the American Farmer candidate must have demonstrated outstanding ability through leadership and co-operation in student, chapter and community activities.

The National FFA convention is conducted entirely by student members, all between the ages of 14 and 21. The six National FFA officers take charge of all business sessions, and 119 official delegates represent the membership in voting on all issures of business.

RESEARCH ON HEAT PUMPS BEGINS WITH 10 FAMILIES

Ten Michggan families served by Consumers Power Company will be part of a nation-wide research project on heat pumps, the company amounced this week.

Purpose of the study is to determine if heat pumps are the most efficient home heating source. If so, their use by large numbers of consumers in this country could help conserve energy sources in short supply.

Heat pumps used by the families for heating and cooling their homes will be specially metered for a year, beginning this month. Monthly results will be recorded by Westinghouse Electric Corp. in a data processor in Raleigh, N.C.

Three of the families are in

Three of the families are in the Lansing area and seven in the Grand Rapids area. In Consumers Power's service-area state wide, only about 250 families use heat pumps rather than more conventional heating sources, the company said.

Heat pumps have a close relationship to solar energy. The heat in air is produced by solar energy and heat pumps extract that heat.

A heat pump uses a refrigerant, coils, and a compressor to heat or cool a home. More than 122, 600 are used in homes throughout the country. Thirty-eight

are being installed in a private housing development at Sugar Loaf in Leelanay County, the company said.

WEIDMAN CITIZENS MEET WITH HUD, COUNTY OFFICIALS ON MONEY AVAILABLE

Four citizens from Weidmnn attended a meeting Monday night at the County Building in Mt. Pleasant to hear details of HUD monies available to area towns and cities, and to present some needs of Weidman that could be met with HUD money, which is "free," in that it does not have to be repaid.

Testimony was presented to establish priorities for Isabella County Commissioners to submit to HUD in Detroit for consideration of funding for local projects.

Chaired by County Commissioner Connie Smith, the meeting went smoothly and well, with several representatives from area towns presenting their needs. Between 15 and 20 speakers were neard, presenting their areas' needs for rederal help.

Lou Fiorillo was spokesman for the town of Wesaman, and did a good job of presentation of needs, such as a possible community center, to be used in conjunction with the Sherman Township Board as the present Sherman Township Hall is old and obsolete; and possible additional street lighting, fencing around the park, equipment for the park, and possible rehabilitation of homes, the latter entailing long-term, lowinterest loans for those finding tunding difficult to obtain.

Many other suggestions came from representatives of other communities, such as a county library system, mental health

care, health clinics for the aged and handicapped, with Sherifff Donald Gillis requesting a detention center for juveniles, to be operated in conjunction with several other counties.

Next step will be another meeting of a community development committee to decide which priorieties should be approved by HUD. Deadline for the committee's report is 12.15 p.m. Dec. 15.

Testimonial letters and personal interest are needed locally for this area to be eligible to receive any of the HUD monies. The general public is urged to become in volved in this project, to show united effort here for betterment of the area.
