Didja know that a tablespoonful of vegetable oil in a small dish of milk will stop your dog's hair shedding?



WEIDMAN LEADS COUNTY
IN DOGS INOCULATED

At the annual dog-inoculation and license-selling session last Thursday night at the Weidman Fire Hall, 90 dogs were inoculated against rabies, and 56 dog the enses sold.

Officials at the Isabella County Mumane Society said Weidman leads the county, percentage-wise, in number of dogs treat-

ed and also licenses purchased.

Of the remaining dogs not licensed at Thursday night's session, owners will have until March 1 to buy licenses, and after that there will be a delinquency charge.

Unlicensed dogs running at large may be picked up by the dog warden, after the expiration date has passed on obtaining licenses.

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FIRE DEPARTMENT HAS NEW 2,000-GALLON WATER TRUCK READY FOR FIRE RUNS

A renovated water-tank truck of 2,000-gallon capacity is now ready for use by the Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Fire Department, according to Fire Chief Spike Branson.

Aided by skills of men outside the Department, the Firemen took a second-hand truck with tank and got it ready for fire runs. It is the Department's second water-tank truck now in use, and need for it has been estabblished on many occasions when the tank truck had to dash back to Weidman for water to fight a fire in some area far from water supply.

Firemen and volunteers outside the Department have been working on the additional tank truck the past two and a half months, Fire Chief Branson said this week

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PHARMACOLOGY CLASS OFFERED AT MMCC

Mid Michigan Community College at Harrison is offering a pharmacology class (NUR 210), which will begin the week of Jan. 8, 1976. The class will be conducted at the Midland Area Hospital, and class nights will be determined upon registration.

The pharmacology class will be a five-credit hour course, and will include four hours of theory and one hour clinical. The cost will be \$62.50 for residents of the college district (Clare and Gladwin Counties) and \$92.50 for out-district residents.

The class will be of interest to RN.s, LPNs, and persons dispensing medicines. Many area hospitals require graduate LPNs to take the pharmacology course or it is a requirement for employment. A certificate will be issued by MMCC to persons successfully completing the class.
