We've sent several of our most serious accident cases to St. Mary's, which appears to be a hospital above most hospitals, from reports of those who have been patients there.


(It's a Catholic hospital, and yes, everyone there seems to be devoted to the patients, white, red, black, yellow, and sometimes green.)

(Editor's Note: We have on our drawing board a very old letter from Lylah (Fleming) Simmers from California, which we still hope to print one day, as it tells of her boarding with Leon and Gladys McArthur and attending high school here, in the very old days.

(Here's a recent letter from

Lylah:)
Dear Connie,

You have been asking that people claim their pictures -- so, some day when you have absolutely NOTHING to do, will you run through the ones postcard size and see whether you can find the picture of Mrs. Cliff, Blanche, my mother, my young-er brother and me, all sitting on the grass in Cliffs' front yard? It is about the only picture I have of my own mother, and stamps are enclosed for its return if you find it.

I have just quite literally returned from death's door. Was hospitalized from the 8th to the 30th of December with double pneumonia, which refused to yield to all usual antibiotics. In desperate effort to save my life, my doctor called a chest surgeon specialist, who whisked

me into surgery.

He probed all major bronchial tubes and took biopsies of related lymph glands. Found a sac of pus in my lungs which in 40 hours revealed in a culture a rare form of bacteria which yields only to one very powerful

antibiotic.

Was of course on IV in the hospital, but my doctor let me come home to my own bed Dec. 30, and take the antibiotic orally. Will be on it for at least 10 more days. Am yet too weak to stay out of bed very long. I weighed in at home at 107!

Little Rachel Simmers Lyddon, one month old today, takes "naps in Nanny's bed" as little Sarah loved to do. The two little girls both have their mother's "rosebud" mouth, but otherwise in no way look alike. Of course, I didn't see Rachel until she was nearly three weeks

My daughter came and was with me much of the day I was in surgery. They had to go back home New Year's Day, so the family all gathered here for New Year's Eve.

I got my four-generation picture I wanted so much. My daughter sat on the edge of the bed, holding Sarah. Ted (grandson) crouched beside her, holding Rachel. And I don't care even if I looked like a witch, bony and with flying hair.



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
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

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Wood power men

Three pioneers in making wood a modern Atlanta, Georgia; and Norval Morey, president of industrial fuel are Ben Russell, president of Econ, Morbark Industries, Winn. An Alabama textile Alexander City, Alabama; Willard McBurney, plant is switching from coal and gas fired boilers president of McBurney Stoker & Equipment Co., to wood burning boilers this month.

A morbark machine that chops up worthless trees into useable wood chips is a key part of an Alabama textile mill operation. The machine is built down here at Winn, and is called the Chiparvester, a nationally known name and performance.

The Alabama textile plant is

switching its power source from oil and coal to wood. Company officials say it's the first nonwood industry in the nation to return to wood as a power source.

The switch to waste wood will save the plant half its fuel bill, according to officials. The Morbark system will also be buying

sawdust and chips from Alabama sawmills.

At Winn, the Morbark plant employs many area men: From Weidman, Remus, Rosebush, Farwell, and so on.

We asked Spike Branson, who has worked at Morbark's for a

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long time, what kind of man Norval Morey is -- what kind of "boss" he makes.

"Well," Spike said, "he's big time, you have to admit that, but he comes out and talks with his workers--calls us by our first

names, and is friendly."
That's doing okay for a smalltime tinkerer who invented first a machine that peeled bark off forest trees after cutting, and who rose to become a nationwide figure in the wood industry.

LOCAL RIGHT TO LIFE PEOPLE ARE ACTIVE IN FIGHTING ABORTION ON DEMAND

At a recent meeting of Michigan Citizens for Life representatives and March of Dimes directors, the pro-Life people made a strong plea for March of Dimes to cease funding genetic studies aimed at discovering birth defects in utero, which often result in abortion.

Although March of Dimes said it would take the matter under advisement, no promises were made.

In the past, the March of Dimes excited world admiration by its solicitude for polio victims, and by its generously directed aid to them in their struggles to overcome their infirmities.

With the victory over polio assured by the vaccination discovery of Dr. Jonas Salk, March of Dimes diverted its attention to birth defects, and is supporting a great deal of research that is worthy of admiration and assistance.

However, say the Right to Life people, when March of Dimes supports genetic screening which searches out the child in utero with congenital defects, for the purpose of relaying this information to parents who generally opt to destroy the defective child,

the Right to Life people say they have no choice but to withdraw their support.

The major aim of the Right to Life organization is the passage of a Human Life Amendment to the United States Constitution. The amendment, they believe, is necessary due to the Jan. 22, 1973, Supreme Court decision by which the unborn is legally not a person and is not capable of "meaningful" life.

of "meaningful" life.
Since the Supreme Court's decision, say the Right to Life people, abortion on demand is legally killing 4,000 babies daily in the United States.

They maintain that the implications of the Supreme Court decision may, in the near future, be applied to born humans resulting in the enactment of euthanasia laws or mercy killing of the sick, handicapped, mentally retarded, and elderly, or those judged not capable of "meaningful" life as determined by the State.
