Area residents are dismayed by the edicts of the health department and the DNR closing the Nottawa dump.


County officials have advised township officers that reopening of the dump in Nottawa would entail great cost: Core drillings; new surveyings; and this and that, all apparently designed to discourage any attempt at reopening the Nottawa dump.

The Nottawa dump has been a model among waste disposal sites and we see no valid reason for its peremptory closing by county and state officials.

FINAL AUDUBON FILM WILL BE ON NEW GUINEA

"Papua, New Guinea--Twilight of Eden," will be this season's final Audubon Wildlife film, to be presented by Greg and Linda McMillan of California Monday evening, March 29, at 7.30 at Warriner Auditorium on the campus in Mt. Pleasant.

Lying north of Australia, New Guinea is the world's largest island. Its nation is probably one of the most primitive on earth.

Examined in the film are both the agricultural and social life of man, and the incredibly varied forms of wildlife in the tropical jungles of the island.

Included are spectacular birds such as the bird of paradise; insects such as huge moths, three-inch rhinocerous beetles, weevils with gardens on their backs; lizards living in the trees; and spiny ant-eaters, one of the world's two egg-laying mammals. Admission is 50 cents for stu-

dents, \$1.50 for non-students.





They were in the water over an hour, while lake residents and other helpers worked frantically with their machines to heave them out.

The horses suffered somewhat from exposure, one suffering a touch of pneumonia; but all had recovered by Saturday night, the Allens said.

The colts are two and three years old, the Allens having purchased them at the Michigan Draft Horse State Sale in Lake Odessa about a month ago.

The Allens formerly had Belgian horses, giants like the Percherons, but have disposed of them and now feature only the Percherons.

NEW PUBLIC ACCESS RULES NOW IN EFFECT

Those using public-access sites administered by the Department of Natural Resources, Waterways Division, are reminded that new site regulations are now in effect. They include the follow-

Camping is allowed only where camping areas are designated by signing.

Ice shanties, boats, and other property may not be stored on access sites longer than 24 hours, except by legitimate campers.

Trash and garbage may not be disposed of on sites except that which is generated by use of the sites. Receptacles provided must then be used.

Vehicles may be operated only on designated roads and parking lots.

Horses are allowed only on designated roads and trails.

Complete rules are posted at each site.


