DNR THREATENS TO DRAIN LAKE WEIDMAN IF SPILLWAY IS NOT COMPLETED EARLY

The Department of Natural Resources has notified land owners around lake Weidman (the old Millpond) that it will drain the lake if the spillway, part of the original blueprints for the new dam, is not completed by July of this year.

The spillway, on the east shore, was definitely a part of the dam blueprint, but some steelwork was stolen from the site and the project was dropped at the time the dam was put in.

About \$5,000 is needed to put in the spillway, admittedly long overdue in construction; but nevertheless, there are many who would grieve to see the old pond (now a beautiful lake) a wasteland again as it once was.

The spillway must have 37 feet of eight-foot steel piling and 75 feet of four-inch, which is in now.

The spillway must have a total of 150 feet of available length for overflow of high waters in the lake.

Canisters have been placed in Weidman stores, in hopes that fishermen who still enjoy casting a line on the old Millpond may wish to contribute to the building of the spillway. Lake Weidman is in fact a private lake; but the land owners cheerfully allow fishermen from all over to use it for their accustomed sport of hauling in the big ones "from the Pond".

The PBB poison situation is a serious one for everyone, from the stricken farmer to consumers of farm products of all kinds.

Hilda Green of Chase, Mich., one of the leaders of the farmers' protest meeting, is a sister of Mrs. Lynch, part owner of a "million-dollar farm setup" that was destroyed by the Farm Bureau feed disaster.

The Greens have a 15-year-old son badly affected by what they believe are effects of PBB poisoning. He was an athletic boy in school, and now suffers liver damage and other illnesses, and is barred from all athletic activities. The Greens' farm is a total loss, so far as livestock is concerned, Mrs. Lynch told the Messenger.

METHODIST PARSONAGE WILL BE BUILT ON LAKE WEIDMAN

struction, with aluminum siding. The basement, besides housing a couple of cars, will contain a rec room for meetings, etc.
