There'll be ball games, including one between the wacky Bay City television station team and "just anybody who wants to play" for our side. That game is guaranteed to entertain young and


There'll be clowns, a fortune teller, penny scrambles, and a lot more--for the kids.

Bernice is survived by her son, Willis, and by one sister, Lylah M. Simmers, of California.


Many here will remember the Fleming family. Lylah has kept in touch with the Messenger for many years.

Evelyn Hackney was presented a plaque honoring the many years she has hosted this popular event.


