You're advised to register with your township clerk if you want to be certain your registration is properly processed and recorded.

Keith Loomis, Clerk of Sherman Township, told of receiving a registration form for a citizen in Isabella Township.

The citizen had registered with the Secretary of State's office in Mt. Pleasant, which supposedly sends all registrations to the proper township authorities.
Somehow, when the State or

the Washington Guyment gets into local affairs they become intolerably complicated and often unmanageable.

Keith sent the Isabella Township resident's form back to Mt. Pleasant to be forwarded (we all hope) to the proper Township Clerk.

Makes one wonder how many Sherman or Nottawa or Coldwater Township registrations might be sent to Denver or Broomfield or some other Township's Clerk for filing.

Sounded like a good ddea at first: Just register to vote when you go to get your driver's license renewed, and that's that.

D & R DRIVE IN RESTAURANT SUFFERS BREAKIN, THEFT

The D & R Drive In Restaurant in Weidman was broken into in the early morning hours of last Friday, April 16, the thieves breaking down a back door for

About \$200.00 worth of frozen foods and other food items were stolen, according to Bud and Gwen Tomlinson, who took over management of the restaurant last December.

Deputies Sisco and Croton have been working on the case. The Sheriff's office said Monday they have some suspects but no arrests had vet been made.

Stolen in Friday morning's raid were two cases of pizzas, with 36 pizzas in each case; two cases of chicken, with 24 servings in each case; and shrimp dinners, frozen donuts, chicken patties, mushrooms, and orange drink syrup.

The thieves had a surprise coming, unless they own a large deep-freezer or large quantities of frying fat: All the food stolen has to be deep-fried (except the orange-drink syrup), and is highly perishable out of the freezer. Large cans of frying fat on shelves in plain sight were ignored by the thieves.

The restaurant also suffered a breakin before last week's, apparently by kids, as only two boxes of onion rings and some gum packages were stolen. \*\*\*\*

In other action, the Sheriff's Department reported Monday that one arrest has been made in relation to the smashing of windows at the Beal City High School, with three more pending. These are 17 and 18 year olds, and will be prosecuted as

During the past week, Sheriff's deputies made arrests for eight minors in possession of liquor, four arrests for furnishing liquor to minors, and three arrests for possession of marijuana, all within the boundaries of Weid-




