THE MAY 18 ELECTION IS A SNORTEROO

The "Michigan Presidential Primary Election" May 18 is much more than that, for the County of Isabella.

Our good County Commissioners have tucked into the ballot the following propositions:

Shall the county (taxpayers) levy additional millage for the taxpayers' subsidization of the Mt. Pleasant airport?

Shall the county (taxpayers) levy up to 7/10s of a mill for the operation of Van Tran and Dial-a-Ride for a period of four years?

Shall the Commissioners hire a County Controller?

That's besides whatever candidates the taxpayers prefer in the Presidential Primary.

Our inclination is to vote NO on all three proposals put forth by the Board of County Commis-

Certainly NO to the subsidization of Mt. Pleasant City's air-

Certainly NO to hiring a County Controller, a highly-paid office that precipitated chaos in the county government administration before and wound up with the county paying for a law-


And NO to the levying of millage for Van Tran and Dial-a-Ride, which is nice transportation for a few elderly people and a lot of college kids in Mt. Pleasant.

Let's get a little sanity in the county government.

We thought we'd get it with the election of a whole new Board of County Commissioners, but we're having second thoughts on that.

Like all elected officials, the Commissioners become, with experience in office, seasoned politicians, and their one object, apparently, is to raise taxation for property owners.

And we're not at all grateful to Jaynice Bierschbach, the County Treasurer, who was credited,





School millages have been turned down right and left all over the state, but the Chippewa Hills Schools routinely ask for more at each annual election.


