CAN WE GET THE SCHOOL FOREST CLEANED UP?

A petition has been circulated among home-owners and residents in the Weidman School area, asking the Chippewa Hills Board of Education to look into the matter of fire hazard from the deplorable condition of the school forest after professional cutters went in there last winter and cut trees, leaving highly combustible profusions of pine branches and fallen trees be-

A copy of the petition to the School Board also was delivered to the Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Fire Department, to let them know there is a terrible fire hazard there, and the people are scared.

The next meeting of the School Board, we believe, is June 4. Meantime, the Firemen have a copy of the petition, and will be on the alert.

The School Forest is a place of beauty, intrinsically; but at present it is frightful fire hazard and an awful-looking mess.

It would take just one live cigaret or one flaming match to set it off. After that, it would be uncontrollable.

There are a good number of homes close enough to the forest that they also would be endangered. We doubt if all the fire-fighting equipment in the county could cope with it.

Let's see what the Board of Education will do about it.

The bingo games at the Sale Barn on Coldwater Road, sponsored by the Weidman Business Association, are going strong, and are very popular.


Last Wednesday night a \$400.00 Jack-pot prize was offered, and it was won by Ilah Graham.



When the train drew into the station he rose, lifted his hat, and in a gentlemanly way said:


