

So we now enter the political activity area leading up to the Aug. 4 primary elections in Isabella County.

Running for re-election is Isabella County Sheriff Donald Gillis (above), on the Democratic ticket, opposed by Joseph Pepper, Republican.

For the Weidman area at least, conditions have improved under Sheriff Gillis' terms in office, with important additions to the communications equipment of the department, and also definite improvement in the Weidman-Beal City areas in the matter of patrolling at night.

Don Sandbrook (below, right) is up Oplinger, Lou Fiorillo, and Berfor re-election, having served nard (Pete) Wood. many years as Register of Deeds in Isabella County. He is opposed by Margaret Heintz (R) and Dorne

L. Davis (D). Joseph Barberi is running unop-

posed for Prosecuting Attorney. Jaynice Bierschbach is unopposed in the office of County Treasurer; Betty Prout (R) is running against William L. Dewey (R) for the office of County Clerk.

Evart Bowerman (R) is opposed by Rex Foster (D) as County Drain Commissioner.

In District One (which includes

the east half of Weidman Town and the west half of Beal City), Connie Smith is running on the Democratic ticket, opposed by Lionel Duncan, Republican.

In District Two, which includes the west half of Weidman and meanders up and down the county, William P. Brown (D) is running against Thomas J. Murphy (R).

Johnny Engler is running for his fourth straight term in the Michi gan Legislature, opposed by William Odykirk of Mt. Pleasant.

Ted Krauss is running for Constable for Sherman Township. Ted was police officer (deputysheriff) for the Lake Isabella area for eight years. He also used to patrol most roads in Sherman Township, until the township decided it had no money for that. (Sherman is paying Deputy Sheriff Wayne Sisco a modest amount now for the job.)

Ted Krauss has had extensive experience in military and police work, having been in the regular Army four years, and also served in the Seabees in World War II. In 1918 he was one of the MPs patrolling the Texas-Mexico border with the Texas Rangers.

Sherman Township will have just one Constable, with two candidates having filed. Don Smith of Weidman long has been one of the two Sherman Constables, and he will run against Krauss in the August Primary.

SILENT HORN SPURS AWARD Jurors in a Milwaukee court case heard a horn that never sounded. The jury had to decide whether a split-second warning could have saved two people from death and one from serious injury.

Attorney for the plaintiffs was Edward Neubecker, son of Mrs. Elizabeth Neubecker of Weidman and the late Leo Neubecker. Edward is a successful practicing lawyer in Milwaukee.

The jury decided that it might have, and as a result a woman was awarded more than \$200, -000. It was a car-train accident

that occurred in 1973. The Kroli kowski car was stopped at a train crossing as a freight train was coming down the track at 30 miles per hour.

A car driven by a man who had been drinking came up behind the Krolikowski car at 40 miles per hour.

The train was about 11 seconds away when the engineer saw the cars. He realized the hazard when he was only a few seconds

"Why didn't he blow the horn?" Attorney Edward Neubecker asked. "He didn't say he didn't have enough time...He said, 'I didn't blow the horn because West Allis has an ordinance against it unless it's an emergency."

Just before the Bourgeois car struck the Krolikowski car it swerved wildly to avoid the crash, but the Krolikowski car was struck and pushed onto the tracks.

There was no question that Kenneth Bourgeois was primarily responsible for the accident, and he was sentenced in 1973 for homicide by intoxicated use of a car. The question given the jury was whether a drinking driver would have reacted a second sooner if a warning had been sounded.

Attorney Edward Neubeck said, of Bourgeois, "He almost made it. Had he reacted five feet sooner, 10 feet sooner, 15 feet sooner, I wouldn't be here today."

The Krolikowski husband and daughter were killed in the accident.

The jury found that the train engineer was negligent. For not sounding his horn, he was only 5 % negligent in the crash, but that was enough to make Northwestern responsible for the entire amount, officials said.






