

But many committees of enthusiastic young Weidman citizens have been working out a program for the entire day and evening that will entertain everybody, young and old.

Featured will be the oldsters, of course; but there will be plenty of entertainment for kids, as Carol Benn's committee has the day planned full of fun, games and contests.

And the oldsters—ah! That's us. We hope to meet and visit with old-timers from all over who come back home for that weekend (the Forest Hill School Reunion will be held Sunday, the day after Weidman Day, at Mitchell Park).

Anyhow, we've heard about a good number of former Weidman residents who are planning to come home at least for the day.

So--we'll hope to see yuh on Weidman's busy and exciting

street Saturday, July 10, all day.
The entire street will be filled

with food-stands, special displays, with the Arts and Crafts coming out the star with its entire space between the post office and Weaver's Tavern filled with display spaces. There'll be everything there, from antique dolls, hand-made, to baking arts, and oil paintings. And on

and on.

The antique show in the old bank building, under chairmanship of Dee Lawens, is shaping up as a star attraction. It will be

a real thing to see.

There will be games and contests and entertainment going on all day and evening, winding up with the biggest fireworks display this county has seen.

Thayne Sides, chairman of that committee, informs us there will be 189 separate pieces of fireworks, plus a last addition, the

American flag, making the total of fireworks pieces 190, one more than Mt. Pleasant plans for its July 4 celebration.

Children's Games WEIDMAN DAY PROGRAM The big parade will start

promptly at 9 a.m., from the Weidman School. It will include musicians, bands, floats, including one carrying the King and Queen for the day, elder citizens of Weidman. It will also have many other features. The parade will move to the Airline Road and proceed thence to the business district, which will be block ed off from traffic for the day.

Right after the parade is over, children's games will begin, scheduled for about 11 a.m. Frank Benn, Carol Miller, Pat and Alan Marshall, and Carol Benn, chairman of the committee, will be in charge of the children's games.

Games will include a penny scramble, a foot race, sack race, wheelbarrow race with regular wheelbarrow, and a peanut on a

spoon race.
A Tug of War will start with 8 and 9 years as one group, followed by 10-11 year olds, 12-13 year olds, 14-15, 16 through 19 age group, and lastly a group of husky 19 through 21 year olds. The older-age contestants must get together as teams, in groups of five, if wanting to enter the tug of war contest. All age groups must have teams of five members each.

All games, including the tug of

war, will be held in the parking lot behind the old bank building, which has been cleaned up and will continue to be mowed.

A final game in the tug of war will involve first winners of each of the other tug of war games.

There is no charge for register-

ing to enter these contests. Weidman Day souvenir ribbons will be given as prizes to winners. Diane Benn is in charge of the ribbon-sorting and preparing job.



Wm. Lawens won high score for the men, with Austin Dent second and Mike Gross low.




