#### Weidman Fishing **Contest Report**



## Fire Knocks Out Messenger Plant

### Appreciation

Sunday evening James Slattery, published of the Mt. Pleasant Daily Times-News, called to offer the facilities of his printing plant to get out this week's emergency issue of the Messenger.

Fire knocked out the Weidman Messenger printing plant Sunday afternoon somewhere between three and four o'clock. Fire Chief Ed Fox, on looking over the ruins, said Tuesday the fire apparently started from an overheated stove.

The Messenger's publisher, Connie Roe, had been in the shop about 35 minutes earlier to check, as was her custom, the pump (which needed daily priming), and the stove. She found the stove burning very low, with controls turned to medium heat. She adjusted the thermostate, waited a few moments while it seemed to work nomally, and left. Thirty-five minutes later the fire call went

The fire was discovered by Fey Johnson, who saw smoke at the building from his father's garage. His wife, Lela, ran and pressed the siren button at the fire house.

A great deal of smoke and water damage was apparent, with some of the printing machinery showing heat damage. No estimate has yet been possible.

Connie had planned seven more issues of the paper, the last falling on Feb. 25. She had several buyers for the offset plant, and had expected to close a deal with one of them next week.
