DEER HUNTING TRAGEDY STRIKES BARRYTON AREA

Dangers of hunting accidents were brought close to home this past week with news of the death of Mrs. Dolores Robinson of rural Barryton. She was 37.

According to police records of the tragedy, Mrs. Robinson, her husband, and two other people were returning to their car when Mrs. Robinson's gun discharged accidentally as she was getting into the vehicle.

Her rifle was a .32 caliber Winchester Special, and when it fired accidentally, the bullet hit her in the head. She was pronounced dead at the scene.

According to reports, the accident occurred in a field about a half mile west of M-66, in Mecosta County.

Mrs. Robinson had lived in the Barryton area the past 20 years.

She is survived by her husband, Jack; two sons, Kim, 15, and Paul, six; two daughters, Vicki, 14, and Christy, 12; also by her mother, Mrs. Bertha Canniff, of Grand Rapids, and four brothers and two sisters; and two half-brothers.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 10 a.m. from the Daggett Funeral Home in Barryton, with burial in the Flake Cemetery.



Reach Agreement At Chippewa Hills

The Chippewa Hills Board of reaching a top of \$12,038 in nine Education and the Chippewa Hills Education Association have reached an agreement on a new contract.

Both sides have tentatively approved the terms in the new twoyear contract. Terms call for salary increases averaging 5.1 per cent above the 1969-70 contract. Single coverage in hospitalization insurance will be paid by the board during the 1970-71 year and full-family coverage during the 1971-72 year.

Beginning teachers with a bachelor's degree will earn \$7,100, with a top set at \$10,098 in eight steps. The schedule for teachers with masters' degrees ranges from a beginning salary of \$7,-450 to a top of \$11,073 in nine steps.

In 1971-72, a beginning teacher with a bachelor's degree will start at \$7,600, reaching \$10,-806 in eight steps. The master's degree schedule for 1971-72 calls for a beginning salary of \$8,100. steps

The non-teaching staff, comprised of bus drivers, bus mechanics, custodians, cooks, playground supervisors, teachers' aides, secretaries and library clerks, has also tentatively agreed to a new one-year contract, with an average increase in salary granted to these groups of five per cent. Tentative arrangements call for fringe benefits for this group equal to those granted to the teachers.

Members of the negotiating team for the board of education were David Dunlop, George Weichman and James P. Jorgensen, The Chippewa Hills Education Association was represented by Ray Nelson and Mary Starr.
