"TRUE CASH VALUE" ON WILD LAND, HERE AND THERE

It has been noted that the GEM Survey Company seemed to hit pieces of "wild land" in Isabella County especially hard, in estimates of "true cash valuation".

We have some interesting figures from Midland County, on the matter of some 1,574 acres of "wild land" owned by the city of Mason and located in the old oil fields of Midland County, east of Mt. Pleasant.

A Detroit realty company has offered Mason \$40 per acre, the best nibble the city of Mason has had on the sale of these wild lands.

The city of Mason first asked \$100 per acre for the land, but gave up on that as no takers ap-

peared.

The city earlier received an offer from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources of \$25 per acre. It is now thought the city might be able to get \$25 or \$35 per acre for the wild land.

Compare this with the John Gott place on Woodruff Road just north of Weidman. The GEM Survey Company placed a "true cash value" on John's 18 acres of wild land at \$13,200.

It is so true and real In our times of tragedy, murder, etc., it is refreshing to know Weidman people have a heart for another human. 'But for the Grace of God it could be us,

and not Zeke. ' ") Here's the article:

He doesn't know how old he really is, was never married, his parents passed away many years ago, leaving their son alone in the world with no formal education, therefore a weekly salary was denied him throughout his life.

He has been generously helped, loved and encouraged by the people in the small village where he lives, being the only family he has ever known.

He can be spotted bright and early each morning, brushing debris from the streets, waving a cheery greeting to the clerks as they open for business. The customers, too, know and respect him, never too busy to chat a moment.

He goes daily to the town restaurant, emptying garbage cans or burning the trash for a cup of good coffee or a slice of home made pie.

In the taverns he mingles with the customers while taking care of the empties and cleaning up, so he won't be home alone every night.

Especially fond of young children, he often takes them to his favorite fishing site for a fun day, getting a good catch every time.

Sometimes he does cleanup jobs at local filling stations, or befriends a stray dog or cat.

He rides his cherished bicycle to his daily chores about town, his only means of transportation, but it keeps him in excellent physical condition.

The entire village has offered him aid, and he in turn does the odd jobs he is very capable of doing, never bothering anyone, and the town folks see that he isn't bothered by bullies or strangers who perhaps wouldn't know the situation.

Now getting well along in

years, some day the town will be very sad, when his thin, smiling face is no longer among them, but knowing that an unfortunate human being was made happy during his entire lifetime through the efforts of a small town with a big heart.

Many years from now, if you should be driving through a small village and spot a battered old bicycle in a place of honor, with a plaque saying, "We miss you, Zeke," you will know this is a true story of human kindness and
