Taxes have been rising every year, without the help of the GEM Survey Company. As they now stand, no person of small means can afford to hold a forty-acre plot, or an eighty, just for the pleasure of owning land.

The small person can't afford it. He can't afford the present taxes on his home, either, even if he is a "Senior Citizen" and claims homestead exemption.

The "homestead exemption" does not exempt the elderly person's home from taxation. It exempts it from a portion of the taxation.

Many of us cannot afford to hang on to what we have in real estate in Isabella County.

State and county administrations have got to figure a way to cut down expenses, rather than the familiar old sob-story of more taxes and more taxes.

There is a limit on what taxpayers can stand.





BETTER THAN A LETTER



ON HIS NINETIETH BIRTHDAY, HERMAN COOK HAD A BALL—A reception, rather, in the Weidman school cafeteria, where relatives and friends from far and near gathered to congratulate him on his good health and sound mind. He spent Sunday afternoon visiting with the throngs who came to see him, and he enjoyed every minute of it. He has retired from farming, but he is alert and energetic, and enjoys the card parties for Senior Citizens at Beal City and Weidman.

Over 125 friends and relatives attended the reception, and Mr. Cook received about 125 cards in the mail congratulating him on his birthday.

The Messenger was on hand, and we were surprised and pleased to receive the following notes Mr. Cook had jotted down for use in an upcoming history of Weidman and the area.

The notes are unedited, and we think they are a remarkable chronology of Mr. Cook's young days:

His motto on the notes says, "To be a neighbor, you must be a neighbor."

Here are his notes:

(My parents) leaving Germany Oct. 1, 1881, with four children. I was nine months old.

Arrived in New York Nov. 1, 1881. Two days (by train) to get to Theodore Hummel's. Stayed with the Hummels all winter.

1882-83, lived in parish house. Bought 40 acres for \$300.

1884 (his father) built house. Dad worked in (lumber) camp.

1885, cleared land. 1886, bought our first horse. 1887, Dad broke his leg. The

camp helped.
1888, Charles worked for Grants
\$12 per month.

1889, 5 cows, 2 horses, 6 sows with pigs.

1890, Mother would spin yarn and make socks to sell.

1890, Remick lumbered Sec. 13 (Broomfield), hauled to Chippewa River and down to Saginaw.

1891, Leach cut hemlock on Section 11. Peeled bark off logs, used bark for tanning and those logs went to the river and down to Mt. Pleasant.

1891, bought another 40 acres,

\$350. Had logging bees to clear land.

1892, Dad quit camp and started farming.

1893, I went to school in winter. Charles started working in camp.

1894, last winter for Hall Lumbering Company.

1895, Hall sold to Bundy Lum-

bering Company.
1896, Bundy built sawmill and railroad between Remus and Weidman.

1897, big fire. Timber woods burned, farm buildings burned in some instances, our barnyard became hot but saved the barn.

1898, I finished school and took over farming. Never got to work in camp.

1899, Bundy finished sawing. 1900, built barn, 36x58 feet, using 50-foot beams discarded from the lumberers' foundations

for piling up logs.
1901, pulled stumps, 950

\$20. 1902, pulled stumps, 530 for \$20. 1904, pulled stumps, 450 for \$35.

1900, bought first mower and

From 1900, Charles, Will and I worked together farming.

On the last day of 1907, married Theta Smith.

That's the end of Mr. Cook's notes, and we think they are remarkable, and also valuable for the historical data they contain.

Today Herman Cook has children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren, and lives a good life on the farm he cleared and in the house he built himself.
