Editor's Column

By Connie AND THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS SAID....

(Editor's Note: It's all over, the Taxpayers' committee met the second time with a committee of the County Comissioners and were told that GEM Survey was right and the Taxpayers were wrong; GEM Survey was hastily paid, and in full, and the "survey" stands, so far as the Commissioners are concerned.

(We shall go on offering excerpts from the transcript of the first meeting between the Taxpayers' committee and the Commissioners' committee, as we believe the conversations contribute to Taxpayers' understanding of what happened to them, and how it happened.

(This week we continue with some of the transcript of that first meeting between the two committees.)

Tilmann: Mrs. Uebele was questioning that her place of business in the country has 90% and a business place in Blanchard at 40%.

Mask: Would recommend you take it to the State Tax Commission.

Ervin: The relationship of the income off the property has no bearing; this building could be sitting vacant.

Mask: This is up to the Supervisor.

Tilmann: I am (missed this next part, along with the tape.) this same line in the value of a piece of property. This I disagree with you. I do have a SH map, a case at point, here is a photo taken from 8 figures in Sherman Township. There are two 80s side by side, there and here. This 80 has 50 acres of wood, 29 acres of crop land--\$19,000. Eighty acres adjacent --49 acres of wood, 22 acres of crop land, \$9,200, lay side by side, broken down here, \$10,-600 difference in adjacent 80 acres.

House: What about buildings? Tilmann: No buildings--river runs through both, less frontage on one than the other, \$10,600 difference.

"People have been just wonderful," Mrs. John Latham said in a telephone interview this week, in relation to the disastrous fire early last Wednesday morning that took their home and everything in it.

The family has been staying with her parents, the Lloy Sper-rys, most of the time, and Mrs. Latham said Monday that they have about everything now they need in the way of clothing (the family escaped in their nightclothes).

Their immediate problem was finding a house to live in, Mrs. Latham said. The Talsma house on the Ted Smith block in Weidman has been offered them until the migrant workers for the Talsmas need it this spring.

A house in Sherman City was available, but its septic-tank system was not working.

Besides all that, Mrs. Latham said, "People have been wonderful. We now have nearly everything we need when we do get a house, except some small items, like kitchen chairs, and

TOWNSHIPS TO ENACT THEIR OWN ORDINANCES

Representatives of Board members of four townships met at the office of Lake Isabella Monday evening and all four declared intent to enact their own local ordinances according to Michigan Public Act 184 of 1943 as amended, known as the "Town-ship Rural Zoning Act."

Township Supervisors, members of Township Boards and private citizens were among those attending the informational meet-

Those townships declaring intent to enact their own ordinances were Coldwater, Broomfield, Rolland, Sherman, and Gilmore.

The meeting was sparked by information that townships in Montcalm County did this, following a county ordinance after Scott Bagby and Associates had worked there, as they have for at least the past five years in Isabella County, paid with county tax monies.

Portions of Public Act 184 of 1943 as amended read:

The Township Board adopts a resolution declaring its intent to proceed under the provisions of Act 184 of the Public Acts of 1943 as Amended, and publishes notices of this resolution within 10 days after its passage, in a newspaper of general circulation in the township.

The Township Board must take the aforesaid action if a petition signed by 8 percent of the persons who are residents and property owners in the township is filed with it, requesting such action be taken.

The Township Board appoints its own Zoning Board. (A Montcalm township appointed five, including its zoning inspector.)

Action by the County is advisory only and not binding upon the Townships.

At least one public hearing must be held, after the newspaper notice is published at least twice. Everyone at the public hearing must be given an opportunity to be heard.

Following adoption of the ordinance by the Township Board, the ordinance must be published in full, together with the map, within 10 days after its adoption by the Township Board, in a

Tilmann: 28--Coldwater--Conley. The first part we were talking about is described except small corner--2 acres out as county dump. Repeated for house. We agreed that some of it is right, what is right for one should be for the other. Must have been charged \$100 across the board -- strictly swamp.

House: Can it be drained? Tilmann: No.

Brown: Any cedar? Tilmann: No cedar. Here's one in Sherman--no card on it--but it's under water.

House: What do you have on the Conley place?

Mask: Broken down, 130 acres, 40 acres, total of \$2380.00. Watson: No buildings?

Tilmann: No.

Watson: Map shows a building. (Looking at plat book.)

Tilmann: (Checking plat book with Watson: Map is off 1/2 acre, building could be on this. 12 acres cultivable land, no timber, so if they apply \$10 per acre we could agree. Here's another--17 acres tillable land (interrupted..)

Mask: That's this 80 acres with buildings.

Tilmann: Building appraised at what?

Mask: \$13,340. 16 acres of wood \$100, house and 1 acre \$1800.

Watson: On blacktop road? Tilmann: Oh, on that you had \$10 on 10 acres--our point is, why don't these apply across the road?

Tilmann: We find it about \$100 acre across the board.

House: Do you feel different when this is broken down?

Tilmann: I don't agree on this 80 acre property. We feel it should be all the way across. You feel it was up to the men who were out there. I don't feel that these guys were qualified. Were you out on this property? (Looking at Mr. Bush.)

Bush: Yes. Tilmann: This piece here, 6 and 1/2 acres of tillable land, that's card 402--you had 6 and 1/2 acres tillable, 19.7 pasture and 9 acres of woods on 38 acres. 2 acres off on the corner--\$3800. That is \$100 across the board. The other piece of property that adjoins it was at \$10 an acre.


