The Commissioners had a tape recorder in the room, and also a court stenographer. The tape recorder failed to pick up some of the conversations, and also the stenographer was unable to hear everything said.

Here are some excerpts of the court stenographer's minutes:

Present: Board of Commissioners: Earl House, Chester Brown and Delmar Watson.

Taxpayers Association: Dick Tilmann, Ron Ervin and Harold Verleger.

Gem Survey: Glen Mask, Dan Smith and Ken Bush.

Equalization Department: Bob

Grinzinger and Lorraine Steven-

Earl House: We want to get this taxation report completed for the Board of Commissioners by Tuesday. Hope this will be the final session and we can all be satisfied and the bickering will be settled. Discrepancies should be pointed out and a settlement made. This is not a formal meet ing but an informal one. I am going to Chair the meeting and try to keep order as best as possible. You can address one another and if it can't be kept in order, we will address the Chairman--no two people talking at once. Let's open the meeting.

Dick Tilmann: First of all, we want to know if the press is go-

ing to be here?

House: The press has not been informed of this committee meeting. I don't know if we can stop the press. If it is the desire of everyone they can attend.

Tilmann: We would like to

have them here.

House: We have a Secretary here and a tape recorder to record the discussion. What is the reason for the press?

1970 REPORT

Well, here we are again, with a new year starting for us. 1970 wasn't very good a year, maybe this new year of 1971 will be much better for us in business. Let's hope so.

It takes a lot of time and work to keep a small Business Association running smoothly, even more so when only a small handful of the businesses are active in the organization. Let's hope that we will see some new and old faces at our next meeting. You are all welcome. We can sure use your help.

In 1970 we spent more money than in 1969, but we ended up with a cleaner town and park, due to this spending. We think it helped all of the businesses in Weidman.

We sponsored Santa Claus, purchased flowers for the deceased, paid the light bills both for the park and Christmas lights. We donated \$50 to our new Library, there are Weidman Messengers sent regularly to the hospital through our co-operation. There were repairs to the park, plus lots of little things that always seem to come up.
Where does the WBA get its

money to operate on?

Our big expenses are the lights, insurance, rubbish hauling and cleaning of the pavilion, rubbish barrels and park areas. But the small expenses do add up, and have to be paid some way.

Now, if you are a new member-to-be, or an old member who wants to become active again, you have a picture of what we do and stand for in the Weidman Business Association.

At this time the 1971 dues of \$12.00 are due and may be paid each month at \$1.00 per month or in one shot of \$12.00 and get it over with for the year.

Some of the old business that has to be done this year is to advertise our town better by putting out signs. We have the signs, but don't seem to have the manpower or time to put them up! We can't hire this done, as we don't have that kind of money. It's always needed elsewhere.

All my business life I have attended lots of meetings sitting across the table, like here, and I have never gone into a meeting with the feeling I have at this time. I feel if I walked out that door, I could have a knife in my back. We got it the other day and I feel, frankly, gentlemen, you don't have my trust. Therefore I feel that if we had someone from the outside in on this we would have someone report the truth. I don't know what you can do with that tape. I wouldn't trust you with that tape and the tape could be lost. I feel from what has happened I have totally lost my trust in the Commissioners and I'm speaking for a lot of people. Would like the press here.

House: Are you accusing us of

changing the tape?

Tilmann: Not accusing you of changing the tape, certainly not. I don't feel that the tape would be used where we wanted it to be used. I would like to see the press at this meeting.

House: When I talked to your Chairman, this was to be a hearing of Gem Survey, Taxation Committee and three from your association and the Equali-

zation Director.

Ervin: As I understood it, there would be one from Gem Survey, three of you guys and the Equalization Director. I don't care who hears, but you see, you have increased your members as to what you agreed to. This is all right as far as I'm concerned, I don't like it, but it's okay.

Mask: I will have to leave, then, they are here to accomplish the work and if you would like them out of the room (in-

terrupted by)

Verleger: I would like them

out myself.

Mask: If there are going to be accusations against them, they should be here to answer them.

Tilmann: Are the accusations against these men or Gem Survey, Mr. Mask?

Mask: I don't know.

Tilmann: As far as we're concerned, it's Gem Survey. (Everyone talking at once.)
Verleger: We agreed to a pro-

position -- three and one.

Ervin: It's up to these gentlemen as far as I'm concerned. There is one thing I would like to say at this time, are we going to have access to all the cards?

Ervin: Yes.

Mask: No, they are not all here—only 11 townships are here.

Bush: (Spoke too quiet for me to hear and tape did not pick it up.)

Ervin: We do have access to the ones you do have?

Earl House: Yes, we should have access to ones on hand.

Ervin: We have questions on adjoining properties, and since all cards aren't here we won't be able to check these out.

Chester Brown: Questions on cards is why the Equalization Department is here, they could find these cards.

Tilmam: May I make a statement. There had been no decision made regarding the press?

House: I don't care if they attend.

Brown: They know we are here but personally I don't think this is a place to have a public forum.

Tilmann: Then are you refusing the press?

Brown: Am not refusing the

Tilmann: Then, I would suggest someone call the press. What do you gentlemen think?

Verleger: I am in favor of it. Ervin: I have nothing here that can't be published.

Tilmam: Material will be given to the press anyway. We feel it is of interest.

House: The press needs to have something to keep them going or it would be a dead town.

Note: Tilmann went to phone the press. Dan Smith of Gem Survey arrived; also Harold Brooks came in. Discussion held on his presence. Mr. Brooks stated he was not representing anyone, left material for Taxpayers Association, if okay will stay a while if not will leave with no hard feelings. Mr. Brooks was allowed to stay.

House: We'll wait till those left have returned.

Tilmann: (Returned and stated:) Press can't make it this morning due to being short handed but will be over this afternoon. Will a copy of this report be made available to all present?

House: Yes. How many complaints do you have?

Frvin: Approximately 350 individuals representing 750 descriptions.

House: Who will be spokesman? Mask: Did all these attend the

Ervin: Some did--all the material we are basing this on is by letter from those who for health reasons or job reasons could not wait three or four hours for hearings. Based on what individuals have put down themselves.

House: Who will be spokesman? Ervin: We will alternate back and forth. Some complaints one individual knows more about than the others; if this is permissable.

House: Let's proceed.

Ervin: I want to explain, this, there is no individual matter, we have no axe to grind with any individuals, we are trying to help the people. Another thing I might say, we have heard a lot of rumors, we can't base this on rumors, we need to bring out the facts. First complaint is from Clarence Theisen. Would you have Mr. Brown's card pulled too? Properties are across the road from one another.

Mask: What township?
Ervin: Union.

Ervin: Would you just take a look at this? Brown assessed at \$12 front foot and Theisen across the road at \$20 front foot. Brown is closer to sewer and water.

Mask: We have the letter and put it all together. Put question on front and we can get the cards and check it.

Tilmann: If we don't have the cards to refer to now, we can't continue. We have a lot from Denver, Chippewa, Deerfield, Union and Sherman. Cards can be changed and at this point I trust no one.

Verleger: When you had this money I thought the job was complete.

Mask: Our job was done, all except the second set of cards. Ervin: You don't have the first set of cards here either.


