Editor's Column

By Connie PROPERTY TAX CREATES HAVOC AMONG OWNERS

Last Friday we received a phone call from a woman in Mt. Pleasant who said that GEM Survey put her small home in that city at \$7,200 "true cash value".

She said she went to the annex and waited the usual four hours to get to talk with a GEM Survey representative, and would not go through that again for anything.

Her complaint of too-high valuation was noted, apparently; the Mt. Pleasant woman said she had that day, last Friday, received a "corrected" valuation from Bob Grinzinger's Office of Equalization in Mt. Pleasant-and the valuation was raised to

\$8,500. She wants to know if she is the only one in Isabella County who suffered a hefty raise in tax valuation after protesting to the survey people.

And we see by Friday's Detroit Free Press where a "citizens" suit" has been filed in the State Court of Appeals charging that cities and suburbs are paying more than their fair share of property taxes.

The suit alleges that the Boyne Mountain ski resort is assessed at \$38,000, or about five percent of its total value.

The suit asks that the tax commission see to it that all property be assessed at 50 percent of its value.

According to the Free Press, the tax commission has admitted that \$140,000,000 to \$200,000,-000 is being lost each year because of inequalities.

Isabella County has uncounted instances of inequalities in evaluation by the GEM Survey Company, and we'll stand on the sidelines and cheer for that Detroit couple who are attempting to get the tax commission to correct or at least recognize shenenigans in land and property valuation all over the state.

It won't be easy, though.
State law says (Bless the Boys at Lansing!): "Conclusiveness of assessor's valuation: Assessments may not be disturbed by supreme court unles they are so at variance with undisputed facts

as to be in eyes of law fraud on taxpayer."

And, "In absence of fraud or discrimination, actions of state tax commission are final and courts will not dispute its judgment. " That's pretty final. COLDWATER TOWNSHIP TAKES LEAD IN LOCAL ZONING LAWS

At a special meeting of the Coldwater Township Board, a resolution was adopted declaring intent to proceed toward homerule zoning laws for the township, which will supersede any county zoning laws.

A recent county-wide zoning ordinance passed by the Board of County Commissioners has galvanized township boards to take action to make their own laws anent zoning.

Most townships admit need for local zoning restrictions, but the County Board of Commissioners' ordinance was unacceptable to most out-county townships.

Coldwater Township is the first in the out-county area to start proceedings toward local control of zoning laws.

A letter from his secretary,

Grace Shober, says:

"It was a great shock to all of us when Mr. Weidman died suddenly Thursday, Feb. 18, in Phoenix.

"He had been in the hospital since Monday and the doctor had thought he would be leaving the hospital by the weekend. Thursday morning about seven they were preparing to take him up to x-ray when he died suddenly, and quietly.

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J. Stanley Weidman

A friend observed Thursday that the death of J. Stanley Weidman represented the passing of an era. Weidman would have replied with a penetrating quip. Exaggeration was fuel to his fine sense of humor.

Nevertheless his going makes all who knew him feel they have lost something they will never have again. He was his own human being and a most re-

warding one.

Weidman overcame adversity twice, once when he lost his money in the thirties and again in 1968 when his son John, with whom he worked closely, died unexpectedly. He never imposed these troubles on others, although in the latter case sorrow was deep within him.

His acquaintance with hardship increased his awareness of life. He valued what he found enjoyable and among his pleasures were his friends. He liked their foibles as well as their virtues and treated their

foibles with witty, gentle humor. His major Durango success was the expanding Weidman mill, a success which provided many families with jobs. He helped bring progress to the town. He never sought public recognition for the causes and individuals he so gen-

erously helped.

His most treasured and enduring relationship was with his considerably younger wife, Madelyn who shared his successes and his sorrows. He took pride in his children and people like Grace Shober who presided over his office at the mill and Denny Viles, his constant golfing companion.

These people will miss him greatly, but so will

many others.



TAXPAYERS ADOPT BYLAWS, DRAW ORGANIZATION INTO SHAPE FOR PERMANENCE

At a county-wide meeting Monday evening at West Intermediate School in Mt. Pleasant, about a hundred Isabella County taxpay- licity be obtained for future meeters wrestled over form and essence of bylaws for the organization to place it as a permanent entity.
