THE POST OFFICE AND THE WEEKLY NEWSPAPERS

Postal costs have zoomed not only in first-class mail, but in other ratings of mailings, worst of all in second-class, or newspaper mailing rates.
Last week's "Grit" newspaper

announced that, due to exhorbitant postal costs, it is preparing to go to private delivery all over

the country.

Grit figures the post office will thereby lose revenue on 500,000 copies of the paper usually mailed out weekly.

Grit is not the only newspaper hard hit by postal rates. All area papers have gone or are going to privately-delivered mailings.

The Morning Sun and Buyers Guide, locally, deliver totally "by hand", or delivery by smalltown boys and girls.

(The Morning Sun has an auto route delivery, as does the Detroit Free Press and other papers.)

The post office will be losing a great amount through the raising of its despised "second-class" matter (heretofore a privileged class of mail, presumed by the American Constitution to be eligible for postal rate favors because of its public-information character).

The Farwell News and Review, one of us few remaining weekly country newspapers, announced recently it was gearing up for private-delivery methods to avoid the exorbitant postal costs each week.

Second-class matter (newspapers, magazines) are charged according to the postal "zones" they are mailed to.

For instance, the Messenger has one subscriber in Idaho, to whom we send a copy each week on an \$11 per year subscription.


According to latest postal figurings, our mailing of that one r copy to Idaho for 48 weeks costs the Messenger \$12.78 per year.

No, we would not cancel Annetta Bellows' subscription on that account. We'll continue mailing her paper each week.

TREE TREATMENT AND TRIMMING...A GOOD JOB

So Ye Ed hired a man from Mt. Pleasant to come over and spray four of her 50-foot blue spruce trees which had become unsightly with dead and browned branches.

(A lot of pine and spruce trees throughout Isabella County show damage or have died, this year.)

So we paid the man \$80 for spraying four trees with Sevin, which we have on hand but do not use except in dire emergencies, such as asparagus infestation.

He came Monday morning and spent a couple of hours spraying our trees. Eighty bucks for the job.

Then, we had to hire a man from Clare to come and trim out the dead branches of our infected trees. Twenty dollars.

A lot of money to spend on evergreen trees -- but these are 45-year-old specimen trees, and we couldn't see losing 'em. Allys Roe bought them and had them planted, way back in the

1940s.

But--why don't more men take up a specialized line of work like that? True, you have to know what ails the trees and what to spray on them. You have to have a spray outfit. (We're gunna get one, \$26.95, next spring, for the required

second spraying.)
It's a vocation highly lucrative. You do have to learn a little about trees and their infestations. Why not?

At Lake Isabella, Ruth Fanson's home suffered a torn-off roof during the storm.


