Our town is really spic and span, and if you don't believe it, look around you at other small towns.


We beat 'em all, for beautiful new business buildings and a neat and attractive downtown business area.

Hats off to us!







WBA STUDIES DETAILS OF NEW COMMUNITY BUILDING

At their regular monthly meeting last Thursday evening, the Weidman Business Association members met in the pavilion at the park, and studied details of air conditioning, heating and cooling, etc., of the projected new community building, 100x-50 feet in size, soon to be built.

A few trees have been removed and the pavilion soon will be moved to the Beal City Park.

DeWitt Lumber Company of Shepherd has been awarded the contract for putting up the new, fireproof, all-weather community building, which will accommodate all area meetings needs, including the bingo games held weekly, sponsored by the WBA and now held at Maeder's building a mile and a half south of town.

Thursday night's presentation of details and costs of heating and air conditioning was put on by Keith W. Gothrup, from the Rheem Heating and Cooling Sales of Rosebush.

He recommended that the WBA put up a cyclone fence around the building, with a locked gate. Vandalism always has been a major castrophe at Mitchell Park here.

REGISTRATION FOR AMATEUR RADIO OPERATORS SEPT. 18

Registration night for amateur radio classes will be Monday, Sept. 18, beginning at 7 o'clock in the Weidman building, and will include demonstrations and explanations of "ham" radio.

The class is sponsored by the American Radio Relay League and the Chippewa Hills Amateur Radio Club. It is a beginning course in amateur radio, which will help participants obtain Novice Class amateur radio licenses.

Nearly anyone who can read can pass the FCC exams after completing the course. There are no age restrictions.

The exams are free, and are administered by the instructor in the classroom.

There will be no charge for instruction, but the materials for the course will cost about \$23.

The course will last 12 to 14 weeks, and will be taught in the Weidman School building Monday evenings from 7 to 9.30.

The instructor will be Frank Benn, who has an Advanced Class license, and is an American Radio Relay League certified instructor.






