On the opposite side, or the back cover if you wish, was a portrait in pen and ink, of ole meanie Taxpayer with teeth bared and brow lowering, exclaiming "WHAT!" (He was blind in one eye, incidentally.)

Aside from the inference of the two cartoons, I did not like the fact that the administration (the Board?) spent taxpayers' money for paper (quite a lot of it, to blanket the entire district), the time of the man, even a school man, for printing the thing; and then the mailing costs, to tell us to raise our taxes.

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LIBRARY TO HOLD PUBLIC MEETING

MILLAGE VOTED DOWN BY CHIPPEWA HILLS PEOPLE

In Tuesday's special school election, a proposal for three mills additional in taxes was voted down decisively by area landholders, 1,469 to 915.

The Weidman area was the only "Precinct" voting in favor of the added millage. Other towns ("Precincts") turned it down with a whoop.

The Board and Administration asked for one mill for each of three separate usages: One mill for transportation, one for building repair, and one for "academic reinstatement". The three mills total was requested for a three-year period.

The voting results in various towns:

Mecosta: Yes 173, No 448, four spoiled, total vote 625. Remus: 216 Yes, 437 No, six spoiled, total vote 659.

Weidman: 337 Yes, 296 No, five spoiled, total vote 638. Barryton: 189 Yes, 288 No, one

spoiled, total vote 478.

The Weidman vote of approval is considered largely sparked by the hard work and enthusiasm of the Chippewa Hills Band Boosters (parents) and members of the excellent school Band. All of them have displayed complete willingness to work hard, cooperate with everyone, and also seem able to infuse others with their vigor and ambitions.

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
