THE WEIDMAN BUSINESS ASSOCIATION IS ALIVE AND WELL AND LIVING IN WEIDMAN

The Weidman Business Association has made a most remarkable comeback, and at this moment it is extremely alive and well and active in the interests of the town and area.

Last Thursday's meeting turned up more co-operation, offerings of facilities, time, and provisions (such as Benn Johnson's Christmas tree) than we have seen in many a day.

The WBA is indeed alive and well---and working.

About a year ago last summer it was legally dead. Attendance at monthly meetings deteriorated to the point of having just the president and secretary on hand, no other members.

The WBA was also broke.

There was, for instance, a bill for well over \$300 for public liability insurance for the park--and there was no money.

And, a year ago last summer, it was discovered that the annual legal papers and fee demanded by the State of Michigan from a legal non-profit corporation, had not been sent to Lansing for the

past three years.


That meant we were dead. Business people, men and women, scrammed around, called a special meeting, elected new officers, and hastily sent in the required fee and application to Lansing. (It required a special fee and forms to make out for re-instatement.)

But it was doné.

The WBA rose from the dead and became a very active and influential entity here.

Credit must go to Gary McArthur, who was president of the WBA during that time, for pulling it back together and getting business people aware of the need for the WBA's work and accomplishments.

FIRE DESTROYS ANIMAL HOSPITAL IN MT. PLEASANT

Fire thought to have been caused by defective wiring destroyed the animal hospital of Dr. Charles Stirling, who took over Dr. Joseph Donaldson's practice and premises after Dr. Donaldson was required to quit active practice for health reasons.

The fire occurred Saturday afternoon between 1 and 5 p.m., when Dr. Stirling was not there. Nine dogs were reported killed in the fire, dying for lack of oxygen, according to reports.

The fire itself was confined to the inside of the building, and eventually died out for lack of oxygen, Mt. Pleasant reports

At its regular monthly meeting last Thursday night, the Weidman Business Association completed plans for the Christmas season.

At last Thursday night's meeting, the annual election of officers was held, with a voted change in the by-laws sending the vice-president automatically into the presidency after a two-year term. All officers now will serve two-years.

Bud Fredrickson, former vicepresident, was moved up to the presidency. Ed Ley was elected vice-president, for a two-year term. Thayne Sides was reelected secretary, and Whitey McCreight treasurer.

Fourteen members were present at the meeting, a better showing of attendance than usual, but

PLANNING COMMISSION TURNS DOWN TRAILER PARK

The Isabella County Planning Commission recently returned a 5-5 tie vote on a proposition by Les Wendel to establish a 50unit trailer park in Sec. 28 of Gilmore Township, and late last week the County Prosecutor, Joe Barberi, ruled that the tie vote constituted, in fact, a rejection of the proposition.

The site was beside a small artifical pond, Lake Pauline, on Wendel's property, and he had proposed to develop 50 lots for trailer homes around the little

A large crowd of Gilmore people attended a public meeting (demanded by law), and were unanimously against a trailer park in that rural area.

Wendel can appeal the Commission's decision before the County Board of Commissioners, but said he did not intend to.

"BATTLE OF THE BOOKS"

By Harry Howard Principal, Weidman School Bldg. The news seems to be full of reports of battle throughout our world today. Most battles are fought with guns and result in many deaths.

Chippewa Hills students have learned recently that not all battles are destructive. In fact, some can be fun, and even very con-

"Impossible," you say? "Not

Their battle was called "The Battle of the Books".

How do you have a battle of books? Perhaps we should also ask, !'Why have a battle of books?"

The "why" part of the question is quite important, and should be answered first. Some very basic parts of any reading program are developing the habit of reading for enjoyment or any reason, and comprehending what is read. Our "Battle of the Books" was designed to accomplish the above items and also create an even greater interest in our reading program.

Now for the "how" question. We divided each fifth-grade room into teams, alphabetically, and all teams were assigned the same set of 10 books dealing with Spanish and black American heritage and problems. The participants were given several books to read and develop several questions about each book. The contest was held over a two-week period, with the first rounds taking place within each room.

There were some very simple rules for each contest. (1) Only the team captain could give the answer for his/her team. (2) They must confer as a team before answering. (3) They must have their answer ready within 20 seconds' time. (4) Each question was worth five points if answered correctly by the first team it was asked. If they missed it, the opposing team could get three points for the correct answer. They also would have the first chance at the next question.

After the room champions were determined, there were contests between rooms to determine a building champion. One could see the enthusiasm building higher and higher as each step was accomplished.

The final phase was the competition among buildings. The first pairing in this section was Mecosta and Remus. Both teams were well prepared, and a very close match saw Mecosta go into the finals with Weidman.

Before giving you the final winner, I would like to name the contestants of the finalist teams. For Mecosta we had Pat Weber. captain; Esther Cass, Russell

Cook, Mike Montgomery, Rob Corwin, John Carmen, Tina

Burnett, and Dan Dennis.
The Weidman team consisted of Pam Tremain, captain; April Wilkie, Doug Shoemaker, Mike St. John, Cathy Shaner, Randy Schafer, Katrina Fisher, and Tim Eldridge.

The final battle took place in the Weidman gym Nov. 23.

Once again the teams were very evenly matched. This was very evident, with the score being tied numerous times, and the final outcome decided by the last two questions.

The final score was Weidman 88 and Mecosta 80.

We are planning more battles on different topics, and with more

grades involved. The next battle will take place quite soon, using the same format. This will be for the fourth graders.

Students already are showing interest and enthusiasm for the next battle. We are also seeing increased interest in our reading program and library books.

I think all of the participants and their teachers are to be commended for putting forth the effort to make the program such a success. It is efforts such as these that build better and more knowledgeable citizens of tomorrow. ---0---


