MICHIGAN'S SCHOOLS: BLACKMAIL FOR TAXPAYERS?

All over Michigan, school boards are demanding more millage--taxation--from landowners, while taxpayers are hollering "Blackmail!" when school boards threaten cuts in school programs.

Detroit is the state's biggest district, and its taxpayers are yelling their heads off, after the Detroit Board of Education announced it needs more taxes to run the schools. (Detroiters gave the Board a hefty millage raise during the past few years, and renewed it. But now the Boards says it is not enough.)

Farwell is another district in turmoil over millage issues and management of school funds and programs -- and taxes.

Chippewa Hills District is no exception. With its teaching staff in command of the school through its powerful union, the Board now says it will present another millage vote Monday, Oct. 18, at a cost to taxpayers of \$1,500 for the election. The millage proposition was snowed under this spring.


At a special meeting last Thursday night, the Chippewa Hills Board announced "cuts" in the school's annual programs amounting to savings of about \$10,000 annually, while also announcing about \$379,000 annually in total savings through cutting of ser-

Ag teacher Daniel Latendresse was given a tap on the wrist with a cutoff of \$1,500 for travel expenses to chat with farmers in the district.

The Board eliminated most class sponsors, with four retained. Field trips, the athletes' shuttle bus service, a 40 percent reduction in requests for teacher supplies, no school furniture replacement, a \$15,000 cutback in remodeling and renovation (maintenance) of all school buildings, reduction of 11 teaching positions, but not elimination of 11 teachers (they can't do that, what with "tenure", no matter (Continued on Back Page)

LOCAL ELECTION RESULTS (As of 7 a.m. Wednesday Morning)

Sherman Township returned its Republican incumbents in Monday's Primary Election, the only real contest being for Supervisor.

Incumbent Earl Oplinger was returned as candidate in the fall elections against two opponents.

The vote: Oplinger 106, Lou Fiorillo 72, Bernard (Pete) Wood

Don Smith drew the one seat for township constable against Ted Krauss, 133 to 58.

The other township officers were unopposed. By and large, Sherman Township voted Republican.

Sherman turned down the millage proposal for county bridge renewal, No 127, Yes 67. The county, however, approved it by a narrow margin, Yes 2, 142, No 2003.

Betty Prout won the Republican nomination for Township Clerk on the Republican ticket against Bill Dewey, 1,564 to Dewey's





THE WEIDMAN SCHOOL FOREST: WILL IT BE CLEANED UP?

This last spring a petition signed by 30 home-owners in a fire-hazard zone of the Weidman School forest mailed a petition to the Chippewa Hills Board of Education asking that the debris left by pulpwood cutters be removed, as they considered it a fire hazard to their homes and families. The petition was signed by 35 Weidman people, five of them sympathetic to the home-owners' plight in relation to the disheveled woodland surrounding the

The petition was duly presented at a Board meeting, but Daniel Latendresse, ag teacher who engineered the contract for the tree-cutting, talked the Board out of taking action, assuring them "there was no fire hazard." Allegedly, he had a county agent, a forester, and such, to back him up.

So--nothing was done.

Weidman residents adjacent to the forest called the State Fire Marshal at Rockford, who came up, inspected it, said he considered it a definite fire hazard to the homes and the school, but he wanted to bring in a forester to corroborate his opinion.

After several weeks, he brought in a state forester, an area forester, and a local forester, all agree a financial report were read by ard with the debris drying out, and must be cleaned up.

Consequently, the Fire Marshal wrote a letter to the Board of Education ordering the Board to cause the forest to be cleaned up and not only that, but fire lanes to be cut throughout, allowing a fire truck to enter in case of a conflagration.

This week Monday we called LaVern Alward, Superintendent of the Chippewa Hills Schools, and he said that the pulpwood cutters were considered responsible for the cleanup and that they were expected to be in with bulldozers to clear fire lanes this week or next.

There was nothing definite, however, again, on the cleanup of the Weidman pine forest.

With our real drouth conditions the past several weeks, the forest remains a threat to adjacent homes and the school building. ---0---

what character a teacher may exhibit or what the circumstances), elimination of an assistant principal at the high school, no replacement of school buses this year, and elimination of all Freshman and Junior High athletic expenses; elimination of some coaches (but not getting rid of them--the teachers' union won't let them); and all secondary classes must have a minimum of 22 students. All kids except kindergarten and first-grade tots must walk 6/10 of a mile to board buses; in other words, kids must group in neighborhoods instead of buses stopping at every house.

The Chippewa Hills Board, like school boards all over Michigan, makes a pass at trimming off small barnacles without getting to the heart of school-operation efficiency.

Like other school boards all over Michigan, the Chippewa Hills Board has lost touch with the taxpayers, and, as the Farwell paper put it, it has lost touch with reality itself.

It's true the teachers' union has a stranglehold on schools and schools' operating monies. It's time to break that stranglehold.

No union should be able to bleed homeowners indefinitely, no matter what rules, regulations and agreements school boards have come to make with any union.

In the case of the schools, it is the Michigan Education Association (laugh) backed by the National Education Association. Of late years these organizations have changed from betterment of teachers' abilities to betterment of teachers' financial status, no matter what teachers' abilities or behaviors may indicate.

(Could any of our \$16,000-a-year teachers in our school get and hold a job in private industry or business paying a salary like that? Please don't laugh.)

Do you as a taxpayer to the Chippewa Hills Schools (68% of our real estate taxes go to the school)—do you net \$16,000 amually? (Now try to laugh.)


