Weidman men reported he had taken pot-shots at fishermen at times, to keep them off that side of the pond.







THE FOREST IS A MASS OF DRIED PINE BRANCHES -- And disfigured trees damaged in winds. There's plenty of work to be done by the end of September, the limit of time a State Fire Marshal gave the Chippewa Hills School Board to remove the definitely designated fire hazard. Pine forest fires have occurred all around us, two close by, besides the disastrous fire at Seney in the Upper Peninsula. One was a privately-owned pine stand between us and Mt. Pleasant, another over near Chippewa Lake in Mecosta County. Thirty home-owners adjacent to the Weidman forest fire-hazard zone after the wood cutters went through last winter petitioned the School Board last spring to simply request Dan Latendresse's FFA members to clean up the debris left by the cutters. The cutting was announced publicly as a Chippewa Hills High School FFA project, unfortunately. It turned out to be a straight school-wood cutters' contract for thinning the trees, for profit on both sides.

Monday work started on "clean-1 ing up" the forest, with a tractor rented from Dick Cook and a machine from somewhere else to chew up the debris, which was simply spewed out on the ground and left, a thick cover of pine kindling for the first cigaret or dropped match

Dick Cook told the

editor, on the scene Tuesday morning, "It's just a matter of time till that tractor gets on fire because they're throwing pinewood dust on the engine, and when it gets hot enought, it'll blow."

It "blew" during the morning,

but the workers were lucky, as the fire was only on the tractor's hood and workers were able to put it out before it dropped to the flammable ground.

Work resumed shortly after that, Tuesday morning, with at least one home-owner calling the State Fire Marshal at Rockford in protest. This area is included in the highly hazardous half of Michigan's mitten, with no-burn restrictions and tinderdry conditions prevalent, including the Weidman pine forest.

Work was finally stopped after 1 o'clock starting, when Connie Skinner called the high school and asked, "Mr. Alward, what are you and the School Board trying to do to the town of Weidman?"

Mr. Alward said he thought the work had been stopped.

He stopped it within half an hour after Ye Ed's call. ---0---

Weidman men reported he had taken pot-shots at fishermen at times, to keep them off that side of the pond.


