So this week I want to tell you about the two kittens I took on, from a litter owned by the Bates family on Lake Isabella.


At first I said I'd take just one. Then I began to think that one tiny kitten would be lonely, but two together—ah, that would be something else.


The other, brownish, mottled yellowish, slightly fluffy, very mushy and demonstrative, is Sadie Thompson, after the baddie woman in the stage show and






