PEOPLE ARE REALLY THINKING ABOUT WOOD

During the past couple of weeks (since Tilmann's Hardware first presented their "Little John" adjunct to oil or gas furnaces), we have been deluged with inquiries and comments on the possibilities of utilitiy companies' failures to supply fuel for automatic heat, and the possibility of bending the old back and harvesting and stacking of wood to burn.

We've seen a number of woodburning stoves and fireplaces, and we are impressed. (We hereby resolve to fire up Ma's old kitchen range more often, try to bring down that \$67.50 gas bill we paid last month.)

Some say they burn wood in their fireplaces all day every day; Dick Curtiss is one, and he has a gorgeous-looking fireplace chimney on his house (bet his fireplace is something to see, too--and feel!).

Anyhow, Morbark's urging to use "the dead, the down and the dying" trees in our woodlots and forests is taking hold.

And a good thing. Heating bills gas or oil, are getting beyond the reach of us ordinary folks. We gotta do something.

Wayne Schneider, manager of Allen Lumber Company, said he burns wood constantly, in his big fireplace on the second level of his Lake Isabella home, and in a Franklin "fireplace" or stove, on the first floor.

Oh, to be young again, and able to chop wood (I've done a lot of it) and stack it yourself! (I've done that, too; in the 1940s, during World War II, as Allys and Ma and I thought we were roughing it back on the farm at Weidman.) (We made hay out of that, though, through Satevepost.)

Rev. Wright, whom I talked with at Allen Lumber Company, suggested that most folks burn-

ing wood for the first time, or the first time in many years, may forget that the chimney must be kept clean of soot or it will "burn out" sooner or later; not a fatal fire, but a scary one. We've had a few, in the old days at the Roe home, and the durn thing chugs and roars and shakes the house. Pa just let it burn out --that was all one could do, in those days. Weidman had no fire department, no Firemen to come a-running and protect your home. The chimney simply burned out till the soot was burned up.

Rev. Wright said that Fox Hardware (and probably other places too) have a chemical compound called "Chimney Sweep" which one puts on the fire in small amounts periodically, and it'll keep the chimney clean of soot. ---0---



Funeral services were held Saturday, Jan. 15, at Youngman's Funeral Home in Lakeview, with burial in the Hesperia Cemetery.



But Do It Safely HERE'S HOW:

A flue-lined brick chimney is a necessity for wood stoves or fireplaces.

The main thing is to get a good chimney hookup without going directly through a wall. (A triple-insulated trimcollar is one answer.)

Free-standing fireplaces have insulated pipe and air between pipe parts.

A stove or free-standing fireplace MUST have fireproof bases to stand on: Brick, cement block, or metal-covered asbestos stove boards (Tilmann's has them in Beal City).

Air ventilation is important. Proper pipe and flue ventilation is a necessity. The only really proper thing is a chimney with firebrick lining.

Never put an uninsulated stove-pipe through a house wall or ceiling.

Never use a stove without fireproof stove-board, brick or cement-block flooring beneath it.

Some newer home heaters (wood burning) have uninsulated stovepipes that go into the chimney through an insulated thimble (a very old device still in good use).

Free-standing fireplaces have their own insulated chimneys. The Franklin fireplace runs either into brick or insulated, safe

chimney that comes with it as package-part. Underwriters Laboratories (UL) will test any products and give approval if they're safe to use. (Both Tilmann's and Allen's wood-burning stoves, furnaces and fireplaces are all UL approved.) Both places will give advice freely upon the asking about any wood-burning installation, whether it's their own product or somebody else's. Ask them about home-safety in

wood-burning devices. Never use a wood-burning device without a pipe-damper. Never allow children to touch a wood-burning stove or fireplace fire section.

Never allow children to manage a wood fire.


